NEWS SUMMARY.

Domestic.—Woodstock is experimenting successfully with asphalt side-walks.

—A contract has just been let for a new warehouse at St. John, to accommodate the increasing West India trade.

—The Carleton Sentinel says: The construction of the Tobique Valley railway is being pushed vigorously to completion.

—The Ottawa Evening Citizen reports that the late Sir Daniel Wilson.

—The exodus of French-Canadians from the Quebec district continues at an alarming rate.

—The commission which will limit the Alaska, B. C. boundary will also perform the same in Passamaquoddy Bay.

—The prohibition commission, W. B. Lamb, collector of inland revenue, said there were at least 2,000 shobenas and he was inclined to say 4,000, and perhaps more, in Montreal where liquor is sold without license.

—Two eminent physicians, it is said, agree that Premier Abbott must abandon all kinds of work for one year at least, and one of them insists on his immediate retirement.

—An Ottawa despatch of September 16th says: At the Carleton Assizes the McGreevy conspiracy case came up today.

—A Victoria, B. C., despatch says: The sealine schooner Triump brings news containing reports of additional seizures of sealing vessels by the Russians.

—An Ottawa despatch to the Montreal Witness of September 15, says: The Government is determined to do something with the Manitoba school question.

—An Ontario Conservative member, who have been here within the past few days.

—A resolution was adopted unanimously by the labor congress at Toronto declaring the admission of Chinese a menace and undeliberate danger to the moral and material interests of Canada.

—The death of Mr. Charles Annand, proprietor of the Halifax Morning Chronicle, occurred suddenly in London.

—The late elections in Vermont and Maine have been disappointing to the Republicans.

—Oliver Wendell Holmes sent a wreath of eighty-five white roses to be placed on Whitaker's coffin.

—On September 14, the New York Board of Health announced five deaths from Asiatic cholera, which had taken place within the previous week in different parts of the city.
