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BLAMES GREED OF MONEY FOR MANY THINGS

Toronto Clergyman, Address- ing Meeting at Charlotte- town, Speaks Strongly.

COMMITTEES NAMED BY THE CONFERENCE

Rev. J. W. Aitkins and Others Addressed Meetings Yester- day—Big Open Air Mass Meeting Held in Park.

Special to The Standard.
Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 15.—
Speaking in the First Methodist
church tonight, Rev. J. W. Aitkins, of
Toronto, Field Secretary of the Tem-
perance, Moral and Social Reform, de-
clared the greed of gain, he believed,
was behind war, the liquor traffic and
the white slavery. The congregation ap-
plauded his references to the growth
of the peace movement and to the
revelations in the German Reichstag
re the war scare fomented by the
Krupps. Rev. Mr. Aitkins showed
that in the first ten years of this cen-
tury 36 arbitration treaties were signed,
there were 10 treaties to 1 war, the
conditions being reversed in the
preceding century.

An open air meeting was held in
Victoria Park and addressed by Rev.
W. Lane, who in dealing with com-
pulsory and voluntary service referred
to the arbitrary power in some cases
exercised by the labor unions. Rev.
R. G. Fulton and John Dystant, of De-
troit, Mich., also spoke.

In the afternoon Rev. S. T. Harriett,
General Sunday School Secretary of
Toronto, addressed a meeting dealing
with the growth of schools in Canada.
The increase is expected in the West.
The total membership, exceeded all
other S. S. schools in Canada by 130,
000. The problem is to retain the pu-
pils entering upon the adolescent
stage.



RUDDER AND SCREWS OF LARGEST STEAMSHIP IN THE WORLD



An excellent idea of the size and power of the steamship Imperator, the largest ship in the world, which is now on her maiden trip to New York, may be gained from the accompanying photograph. The great Hamburg-American liner measures 919 feet in length, 98 feet in beam and has a tonnage of 50,000. The rudder which directs this great bulk weighs nine tons, but is so delicately adjusted that it may be controlled from the bridge by a single hand. The Imperator is driven by quadruple screws of turbinium bronze, each with a diameter of more than sixteen feet, which turn at a normal speed of 185 revolutions per minute, developing an average speed of 22 1/2 knots per hour. The Imperator sailed from Hamburg June 11 and will arrive at New York June 18.
