DISGUISED WOMAN SHOOT POLICEMAN

Halifax Has Decided Sensation
—More or Less Mystery
Connected With Case—Of-
ficer Not Seriously Hurt.

Halifax, Oct. 10.—While on his way to duty this morning, Provost Sergeant Hunt met a young person walking along Gortown street wearing khaki and civilian clothes and in-
formed him that he was improperly dressed. The youth told the sergeant to mind his own business, and pulled out a revolver and commenced firing. The sergeant grappled with the person, but the latter fired point blank at the sergeant, a bullet entering his arm. Two other shots were fired in rapid succession, but neither hit the sergeant. The shooter got away, but was pursued and caught by military police who were patrolling the streets. At the police station the prisoner refused to divulge name or talk at all.

Later, the prisoner turned out to be a woman with closely cropped hair.

CALEDONIA NOW A DESERTED VILLAGE

Prosperous Place Once, By
Now Practically Uninhabited—Mysterious Cattle Poi-
soning.

Riverside, Oct. 10.—Caledonia, which was once one of the most prosperous communities of Albert county, has become practically a deserted settlement. The vacant farms are now owned by the farmers of Hopewell Hill, Riverside, Albert, Harvey, Rosevale, etc., and are used extensively as pasture land for young cattle during the summer.

A number of cattle on three contiguous farms have died recently from some mysterious cause. One man lost eight which at the present price is a very serious loss to him and a food loss to Canada. Opinions differ as to the cause. Some incline to the view that some moral idiot has poisoned them, while others incline to the belief that the protracted wet weather has promoted the growth of unusual quantities of toxic stools and the cattle have been poisoned from eating these.

PTE. H. J. GELBERT KILLED IN ACTION

Sussex Receives Official Word
of Death — Leaves Large
Family.

Sussex, Oct. 10.—Official word has been received of the death of Pte. H. J. Gelbert, killed in action, in France on September 20th. Pte. Gelbert went overseas in the pioneer section of the 104th Battalion. The circumstances surrounding the death of Pte. Gelbert are particularly sad inasmuch as he leaves to mourn his loss a wife and five small children, the little tots ranging in age from 2 to 9 years. He also leaves to mourn a widowed mother, Mrs. Sarah Gelbert of 90 St. James street, St. John, two sisters, Mrs. R. B. Henry, Havelock, Mrs. Arthur H. Graves, Goshen, and two brothers, C. W. Gelbert, with the McClary Manufacturing Co., St. John, and Willard Graves, Idaho, U. S. A.

LUDENDORFF IS AT BERLIN CONFERENCE

Washington, Oct. 10.—Overtures by the Germans to the British were reported in despatches today from a neutral country to the state department. Only a vague account of the movement is given, but the Germans are said to be making conciliatory promises to Czech leaders in an effort to align them with the Teutonic peace programme.

Washington, Oct. 10.—From one of the European neutral countries today a report reached the state department that General Ludendorff has suffered a physical collapse and relinquished command of the German army.

Basel, Oct. 10.—General Ludendorff has arrived at Berlin from the German grand headquarters to take part in conference to be held at the German capital, according to information received here today.

CUBA OFFERS TO SEND SOLDIERS

United States, However, Can-
not Avail Herself of Patri-
otic Desire of Her Ally At
This Time.

Havana, Oct. 10.—President Menocal, of Cuba, on September 11, through the Cuban minister at Washington, offered to the United States government a contingent of Cuban troops for service on the battlefields against the Central Powers. This was made known last night, when the President's communication together with a reply signed by Robert Lansing, United States secretary of state, was made public.

Secretary Lansing expressed the deep appreciation and gratitude of the American government for the patriotic offer of the Cuban government. He explained, however, that the United States is at present supplying, arming and equipping the constantly increasing American armies and those of the Allied armies, who have been on the field of battle during the past four years would consume the output of all American factories both civil and military, for some time to come, and that practically every ship has been assigned for months in advance to some vital war need, making a readjustment in available advantage could not be taken of the offer at this time.

Secretary Lansing asked, therefore, that the Cuban army continue, as in the past, to render valuable service in the guarding of the coast of the island until such time as a change in conditions may make possible fulfillment of the offer.

HUGHES TALKS.

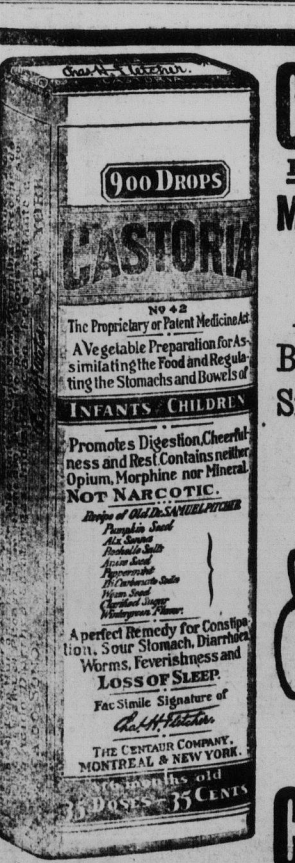
London, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuters Limited.)—Premier Hughes, of Australia, addressing Australian business men in London Wednesday, declared that Germany knows she is beaten, hence the Socialists, who are subservient tools of autocracy, get a place in the ministry.

He declared that Germany's offer was a trick to avoid the penalty for her "vital deeds." Referring to war materials, Premier Hughes reiterated that there would not be enough to go around. "After the war we must be just to our allies and ourselves. Germany has crippled France and Belgium. She now asks her share of war material. We'll let her have it when, but not until, she puts France, Belgium, Italy and all the Allied nations in a position to compete on terms of equality with her. Let her rebuild the ruined cities and factories of France and Belgium. Let her replace the machinery and plants she has wantonly destroyed or stolen. Let her hand back those patterns and trade secrets which she has also stolen and let her compensate the French and Belgian manufacturers and workmen." (Applause.)

GERMANY SHOULD BE WELL PUNISHED

London, Oct. 10.—The demand for something more than unconditional surrender from Germany is becoming intensified in the newspapers here. Letters recalling the crimes of Germany and urging retribution include one from Professor Spencer Wilkinson, who declares that a condition precedent for the cessation of hostilities should be the occupation by the Allies of Metz, Strassburg, Mainz, Trier, and Pohl.

Viscount Middleton, former secretary of state for India, asks that the Allies make a declaration that peace shall not be made until retribution is exacted from German towns for vandalism in France. The Times describes the enemy's policy of burning and destroying towns as he retreats as a "cruel and mean blackmail," and says that German towns like Hamburg and Frankfurt must be marked down for ransom in return for French and Belgian towns wantonly destroyed.

HOOR IS GRAVE SAYS KAISER

Report That He Has Abdicat-
ed Too Good To Be True.

Stockholm, Oct. 10.—There is a persistent rumor here that Emperor William has abdicated.

Amsterdam, Oct. 10.—Emperor William in thanking the German industrial association for its vote of confidence is quoted by the Cologne Gazette, as saying: "The hour is grave. We are fighting for the future of the fatherland and for the protection of the soil of the homeland. To that end we need the united action of the intellectual, moral and economic powers of Germany. On the co-operation of these powers our invincibility rests."

"The will for defence must bind all separate views and separate wishes into one great unity of conception. God grant us the courage of the spirit of the war of liberation."

Rumor Long Current.

Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 10.—Secretary of State Lansing, who is here attending the Centennial of the Auburn Theological seminary, in discussing the rumor which came from Stockholm today that Emperor William had abdicated, said: "That has been current for some time. Unless we know in whose favor the Kaiser is abdicating the story has no significance whatever. If it is simply setting up one of his sons in his place the situation would not be changed in the least. But if he should abdicate in favor of a democratic Germany it would mean something."

FIRE 10,000 SHELLS A DAY ON GERMANS

London, Oct. 10, (British wireless service).—During fifteen successive days recently the British artillery has hurled more than 10,000 tons of shells a day upon the enemy, according to a statement by Winston Spencer Churchill, the minister of munitions. Churchill showed the expenditure of such a vast amount of munitions was possible through the intense industrial organization of the country, which had contributed a generous supply of shells.

The great scope of this organization was revealed by the minister through his statement that between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 persons were engaged in the making of munitions in Great Britain.

BOCHES ENDEAVOR TO HOLD TURKEY

Rome, Oct. 10, (Havas).—The impression of Italian diplomatic circles is that one of the principal reasons for the German and Austrian movement in the direction of peace was to prevent Turkey from seeking a separate peace. Turkey was told, it is understood, that following the new German chancellor's speech and armistice proposal that there would be formed in all the entente countries and especially in America peace parties.

MAJ. H. S. JONES IS HONORED

Service of Apohaqui Officer
Recognized By Award of
Colonial Auxiliary Forces
Decoration.

Sussex, Oct. 10.—Recent general orders announce that the Colonial Auxiliary Forces' decoration has been awarded to Major H. S. Jones, Apohaqui.

Major Jones entered the service in August, 1897, as a lieutenant in B Co., 74th Regiment, promoted to captain in 1908 in command of C Co., 56th Battalion, C. E. F. In January, 1915, promoted to second in command of battalion in March, took a leading part in recruiting about 1,700 men for this battalion and the drafts sent before going overseas. Trained at Sussex and Valcartier and proceeded overseas in October, 1915, shortly after reaching England the 55th was attached to the training division and was made a reserve battalion and Major Jones was placed in command of the 56th Reserve Battalion. He remained in this position until the drafts of his unit were transferred to France. Few Canadian units can show more honors won by officers and men than the 56th and it has the distinction of being the only New Brunswick unit to produce a Victoria Cross.

Although Major Jones asked to be sent to France the medical board decided that he was physically unfit for the trenches. He was then offered either a staff position in England or return to Canada to raise forestry drafts. He chose the latter and the forestry drafts raised in New Brunswick during 1917 were under his direction.

WHY GERMAN NATION ASKED FOR PEACE

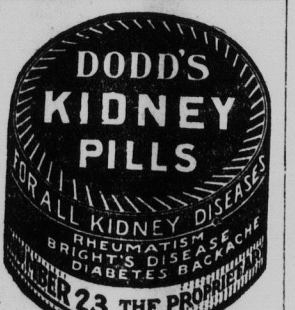
Amsterdam, Oct. 10.—The Frankfort Zeitung in explaining to its readers the reason why Germany asked for peace says: "After Bulgaria's collapse Austria-Hungary resolved to approach President Wilson with an offer of an armistice for the purpose of bringing about peace negotiations. At the same time a similar step was being prepared in Turkey. Germany thereupon decided to join the movement and Chancellor Max Baumbach made his appeal to President Wilson."

MONCTON MAN DIES.

Moncton, Oct. 10.—Mrs. Chandler G. Scurry today received notification of the death of her son, Pte. William R. Scurry, on September 22, the effects of gunshot wounds. He was formerly employed in the C. G. R. offices. He is survived by his parents and one brother, Frank, who is now in France.

HUN MINISTER QUILTS.

Copenhagen, Oct. 10.—According to a semi-official report from Berlin, the resignation of General Von Stein as Prussian minister of war has been accepted. Major General Scheuch, it is said, has been appointed his successor. Scheuch has been at the head of the department of munitions in Berlin.



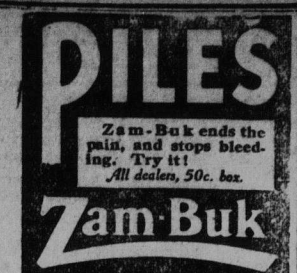

JAPS AND ALLIES CAPTURE FIVE SHIPS

Tokio, Thursday, Oct. 10.—(By the Associated Press, official).—The Japanese war office today announced that the booty captured by the Allied forces in the Amur district of Siberia between September 18th and September 22, included five steamships, thirty cars, five automobiles, 512 rifles and machine guns, seventy cases of ammunition, and thousands of bayonets and lanterns.

The statement adds that cavalry and infantry pursuing the enemy from Zeya in the direction of Banbuk, captured Iorakal and Jolbin on September 27th. A detachment of the third division from Tchita reached Wefezinsk on September 29th.

"The Zeya river has been cleared of mine swarms," says the statement.

WORLD'S RECORD IN BIG GAME FISHING

A 314 Pound Marlin Sword
Fish Landed With Light
Tackle in 28 Minutes—
Other Records Made in Cat-
alina Island Waters.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 10.—Another world's record in big game fishing was shattered in the Catalina Island waters, when James W. Jump recently landed a 314 pound marlin swordfish, in 23 minutes, with light tackle. Not only is this unprecedented with light tackle, but the fish was near the Tuna Club record for a swordfish on any tackle. The biggest one ever caught was in 1915, which weighed 352 pounds.

Not in many years have the deep-sea fighters been so plentiful as this season off the famous Southern California banks. Great swarms of yellow-tail and other light tackle prizes have been frequent. The leaping tuna, dolphin and marlin swordfish, weighing in size from 50 to over 300 pounds, have been plentiful. W. C. Boschen, of New York, is credited with capturing 99 tuna and 5 swordfish for the season. His nearest competitor is Jas. W. Jump, of Los Angeles, with 86 tuna and 11 swordfish. Ralph Vandeni holds the record for the season with the largest tuna caught. It weighed 149½ pounds.

Prizes to be awarded by the Tuna Club for the largest yellow-tail, white sea bass, bonita, albacore and tuna sea bass this year will go to novices in the big game fishing sport from all parts of the country, some of whom have never previously caught anything larger than a fair sized trout.
