William Fox Made Offer For Big Fight

Motion Picture Producer Was Ready to Hang up \$550,000 Purse for the Heavyweight Bout.

New York, Jan. 7.—Following the announcement this morning that Carpentier had accepted the offer of James Cofferth for a battle with Dempsey in this country, the state ment was made here by William Fox, motion picture producer, that he had made an offer aggregating \$550,000 for the bout. His proposition has not yet been accepted, however.

Fox said he had offered Dempsey \$300,000 and thirty-five per cent of the gate receipts if he won, or fifteen per cent if he lost with the stipulation that the other half be divided among the Red Cross of Canada, England, Australia, France and the United States.

His proposal to Carpentier, it was stated by Fox, was \$125,000 for the bout together with the equivalent of what he would lose by the cancellation of his vaudeville contracts, which was estimated at an equal amount. The offer in regard to gate receipts was the same as that made to Dempsey.

Mr. Fox said he telegraphed to Jack Kearns, manager of Dempsey, Monday night and sent a representative from Los Angeles to see him, but that he had received no reply. He added that if his proposition was accepted he would have the bout staged by his business staff, and he would like to have it held either in New York or Connecticut.

NO IMMEDIATE REDUCTION IN PRICES OF FOOD

U. S. Attorney General Says Agreement Between Gov't and Packers Will Not Affect Prices at Present.

Washington, Jan. 7.—No promise of immediate reductions in food prices, as the result of the dissolution agreement between the Government and the packers, is seen by Attorney General Palmer, he told the Senate Agriculture Committee today, in explaining the circumstances leading up to the settlement.

All the things which the Government could possibly accomplish by gaining a decree adverse to the packers, after bringing a case to trial in the courts, was accomplished with that agreement, Mr. Palmer added. Indeed, we got many things that I doubt could have been obtained by such a decree. We have a perpetual injunction against monopoly by the packers, against unlawful trade practices, and all of the matters at issue, without any provisions which would prevent the Government from re-opening the case at any time.

Baseball Comm. Holds Meeting Today

Fight Will Probably be Made to Oust Hermann from Chairmanship of National Commission.

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 7.—August Hermann, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, would not say tonight whether he would resign from that position at tomorrow's meeting here of the commission. When asked if he contemplated resigning he said: "All I can say is, you be at the meeting."

Hermann has repeatedly announced that he is pledged not to vote for a man interested in one of the clubs in the circuit further serve in the capacity of chairman. He maintained, however, that he could not quit until a successor had been appointed.

Unless Hermann does voluntarily resign, it is believed that a deadlock will start at tomorrow's session. John Heydler, President of the National League, before leaving New York for Cincinnati Tuesday night stated that he is pledged not to vote for any man as chairman who has financial interests in any club, and there is no doubt that B. B. Johnson, President of the American League, will vote for Hermann. Such a situation would mean the retention of Hermann. Heydler and Johnson are expected to reach this city tomorrow morning. Outside of the chairmanship it is predicted that the chief business will relate to the major leagues playing schedules for 1920. Heydler and Johnson are expected to prepare rough drafts of the schedules. These will be submitted to the league's schedule meetings next month.

Ottawa Defeats The Canadiens

In Fast and Sensational Game Abounding in Spectacular Features, Senators Win, 4 to 3.

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—Canadian Press Limited.—After a fast exhibition, played on a fast night of ice, with seven thousand, five hundred spectators looking on, the Ottawa Hockey team defeated the Canadiens here tonight and regained first place in the National League, the defeat of St. Patrick's at Quebec putting the Toronto's team down in second place. The final score in the game stood four to three for Ottawa, but it was the closest call that the Senators have yet had on their own ice this year and until the bell rang for the conclusion of play the result was very much in doubt as "Newsy" Lalonde and his habitués put up a great argument.

Montreal, Jan. 7.—Eugene Brosseau, Canadian Champion Middleweight, and one of the much discussed fighters on the continent, was today tendered a contract offering him a bout with the world's middleweight champion, Mike O'Dowd, at Jersey City on February 23. The contract came from Dave Driscoll, the Jersey promoter, who offers Brosseau twenty-five per cent of the gross receipts.

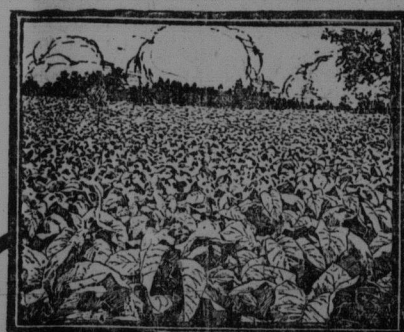
