ANOTHER WRECK IN ST. LAWRENCE

German Steamer Hard and Fast on Rocks of Flower Ridge IS FULL OF WATER

Passengers Taken Off by the Sicilian—Prinz Oscar Left Montreal Last Saturday Morning Bound for Rotterdam.

Montreal, June 21.—The Canadian liner Prinz Oscar, which left this port on Saturday morning for Rotterdam, was reported to have gone ashore at Flower Ridge today, a point about one mile south of Lorne Island, at 7.45 on Monday night.

It is said that the stranded vessel's forward hold is full of water, but so far it has not been found possible to determine to what extent she has been damaged.

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More Than 100,000 This Year

Every Steamer Arriving at Montreal is Loaded

Six Thousand Now on the Ocean—Immigration Officials Estimate Newcomers will Double Last Year's Arrivals

Montreal, June 21.—It is figured by railway officials that the immigration into Canada this season since Jan. 1 from Europe is almost 112,000 people, which is considerably more than for the whole of last year, and much more than twice as much as for the same period of last year.

The present season will easily break all records for immigration, almost doubling previous figures.

KING GEORGE DEFENDED FROM THE PULPIT

Dean of Norwich Denies That He is Intemperate or Ever Contracted a Morgantic Marriage.

London, June 20.—The Dean of Norwich yesterday made a remarkable address in a church near Norwich, in which he referred to King George as "a man to my personal knowledge of intense self-reliance and of high character."

"The accusation is still more unworthy, that prior to his marriage to the present Queen he had what is called a secret or morgantic marriage, with children by it. That is absolutely, root and branch, an untruth. The King is a man who ever, from the point of view of health, has to be abstemious. He does not desire to be anything else."
