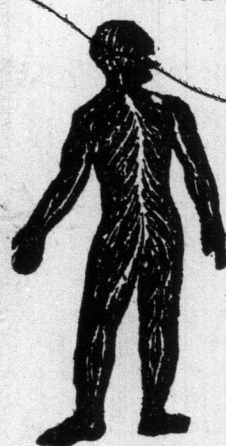

SEES TROUBLE FOR QUEBEC IN LABOR MOVEMENT

Minister of Labor Warns Against Racial and Religious Strife.

FEARS DISCRIMINATION

Fortin Charges Dept. With Only Recognizing International Unions.

OTTAWA, March 23.—(By Canadian Press).—That racial and religious strife are the possible outcome of the growth of the Quebec Catholic labor movement was the warning conveyed by Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor, to a delegation representing these organizations which met him today.

The delegation came to submit a program of legislation which it drafted at a convention held by the Catholic Unions at Chicoutimi, Quebec, and the item which provoked the minister's warning was a request that the Catholic Unions be given representation in the building trades conference to be held in Ottawa on May 3, next.

Urged Caution. "Last year I pleaded with your organization," declared the minister to Abbe Fortin, who headed the labor men, "to proceed very carefully along the lines sets in the mind of the people that in your province for a man to get along in his work he must accept a certain religious guidance, it will not be conducive to the improvement of relations between your province and other parts of the Dominion."

Would Cause Trouble. "You have charged discrimination by the department against your union, yet you make it necessary for a member of your organization to be of a certain faith. What would be the result if the Methodists, say, in Ontario should band together and ask the employers to employ only Methodists? I am sure that, not only Catholics, but Protestants as well, would rise against such a movement."

Abbe Fortin charged the department with recognizing only the international trade unions, despite the fact that Catholic Federated Unions in Quebec numbered between 40,000 and 50,000 members. He urged that equal consideration be given his organization, declaring that such is being done in practically every European country where Catholic, Socialist and Protestant unions exist. He further contended that the labor section of the peace treaty made such provision.

Has No Say in It. Senator Robertson pointed out to the delegation that the building trades conference referred to had not been organized by the Government, but by members of the international unions and of the builders, consequently the minister could not dictate to either party that a third party should be admitted. Furthermore, he explained that the agreement of all nations subscribing to the peace treaty was that each country should recognize associations of employers and associations of labor which would give each class the greatest representation. In Canada these organizations were respectively the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress.

Ernest Lapointe, member for Quebec East, who introduced the deputation, protested against the decision of the minister, in recognizing only international unions.

LLOYD GEORGE GIVES FACTS ABOUT IRELAND

Quickly Silences Asquith Criticism Regarding Recent Rebel Executions.

ELECTIONS TO BE HELD

Negotiations Held Up Because Ireland Has No Courageous Leader.

LONDON, March 23.—An Irish debate was raised in House of Commons today by Francis Dyke Akland, in appealing to the Government to act with magnanimity before Easter. He advocated the summoning of a constituent assembly to choose the form of an Irish constitution. The members who supported Mr. Akland made much play of the analogous situation in South Africa.

Former Prime Minister H. H. Asquith criticized the Government's failure to employ the same vigor in vindicating the law in Ireland against the crown forces as against the Sinn Feiners and, in suggesting that the Government again get in touch with the representatives of the Irish people, said it was useless to lay down impossible conditions in such negotiations.

Gives the Facts. Replying to Mr. Asquith's indictment of the Government in connection with the executions at Mount Joy and elsewhere, Mr. Lloyd George said that two of the men executed at Mount Joy were murderers, and that the other four were engaged in an ambush to kill policemen; they were taken when one of them was shot.

He gave similar details of the other cases adduced and added that Mr. Asquith could have taken no other course had he been in power than the Government had done.

"I venture to say," he went on, "that the United States papers while quoting Mr. Asquith's statements will not publish the same now as they did then."

Get One Side Only. He contended that such misrepresentation was responsible for opinions in the United States. On the question of negotiations the prime minister announced no new policy. He said the Government was anxious to hold elections under the home rule act in Ireland next May for both the north and south, and if the representatives of the south chose to participate, the two parliaments could then meet as a constituent assembly under the provision of that act to consider and recommend changes. If they refused thus to participate the responsibility would be theirs.

Respecting negotiations, his previous offer still held good; there would be no demand for the prior surrender of arms as a condition of such negotiations. The surrender of arms would only be required as a prior condition of a truce or armistice.

Doing Their Best. Mr. Lloyd George declared he was laboring to the utmost to keep the door of peace and conciliation open, and Irishmen ought to assist. Some of the greatest men in English history had tried, but failed, to solve the Irish problem, and he and his colleagues felt no shame that up to the present they had failed.

He feared that the real reason which prevented negotiations was that there was no Irish leader possessing sufficient courage to face his people and tell them he was going to abandon certain demands for the sake of Ireland which it was impossible for the British Government to meet.

Were Disappointed. The Irish and Labor members, including Arthur Henderson, expressed the greatest disappointment over the prime minister's speech, and reproached Mr. Lloyd George for his treatment of the late John Redmond, when the latter courageously tried to bring about reconciliation, as justifying the Sinn Feiners' reluctance to place confidence in the prime minister. Mr. Henderson said that before the Sinn Feiners could respond to Mr. Lloyd George's present suggestion they must have very definite assurance that the negotiations would lead to definite business.

WORKERS ACCEPT CUT IN WAGES

100,000 Packers Sign Agreement Following Conference At Chicago.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23.—Workers in the packing industry, numbering more than one hundred thousand, accept the recent wage reductions of approximately 12½ and 15 per cent under an agreement signed late today by their spokesmen with representatives of the five leading packers.

The agreement also provides for the basic eight-hour day and for extension for six months, or to September, if the packers should demand it. The wage scale as agreed to corresponds with that put into effect March 7 by the big packers. It reduces the wage rate for all employees eight cents an hour and amounts to a reduction in piecework wage rates of 12½ per cent.

SAYS MAGISTRATES SHOULD BE GIVEN SUFFICIENT SALARY

Sarnia Official Discusses Proposal of the Ontario Legislature.

SARNIA, March 23.—While not affected by the legislation proposed by the Ontario Legislature, which, if adopted, will prohibit a magistrate who is a lawyer from following his practice as a side line, Magistrate Gorman believes that such regulations are passed magistrates should be placed on the same basis as county judges and should be given sufficient salary to provide a proper living.

Submission of evidence in the case of John F. Turr against William S. Swan, et al. an action for alleged infringement of patent rights, was carried on throughout the session of the Lambton spring sittings in the county courthouse here, and had not been concluded when the court adjourned today. The evidence was of a highly technical nature, dealing with the different inventions for condensing and pasteurizing milk, patents held by whom and where, and the testimony of the witnesses on the witness stand for over three hours, and other matters.

The preliminary hearings in the case of Wm. Hunter, Oscar Anderson and Allen Irwell, in which the alleged theft of merchandise from a Grand Trunk freight car, were further adjourned today until Tuesday. The case of Fred R. Hamilton is scheduled for hearing tomorrow, but it will probably go over until Tuesday also. The hearings in the first three cases was renewed.

Mr. McLeish alleged that he did not know these were there, although he opened the room in the hotel with a key which was in his possession, and he is the owner of the stable. The inspector also took away a dozen or more whiskey bottles that appeared quite "fresh."

Lawyer Best acted for McLeish, and Crown Attorney Seager for the inspector. The court reserved judgment for a week.

NOT WITHDRAWING TROOPS.

TOKIO, March 23.—Determination of Japan's policy toward Russia, including probable informal recognition of the Government of the Far Eastern Republic of China, is expected shortly, according to the Yomi Uri Shimbun today. It thinks, however, that Japan will continue to maintain troops at Vladivostok.
