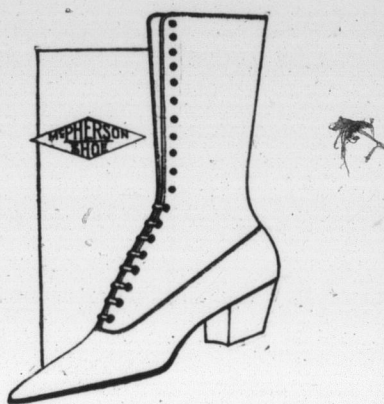

Mr. Purter returned after an extended trip to London and vicinity.

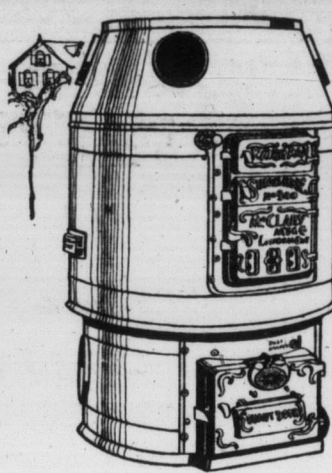
Misses Ila and Waitie Quigley are attending the summer school at Kingston.
