Tragic Loss

On August 1, 1952, Flight Cadet James Rogers MacDonald was killed when the aircraft he was piloting crashed in a field near Trenton, Ontario. The eighteen year old student had just completed his first year at the University of New Brunswick, and was in summer training with the Royal Canadian AirForce.

Roger had come to U.N.B. as a Beaverbrook Scholar in the Fall of 1951. A good student, he was one of the leaders of his class. He was also an active participant in student affairs and was elected Secretary - Treasurer of the Freshman class. Roger had the honout of being the first president of the campus Badminton Club. A fine sportsman, he was the singles member of the Varsity Badminton team, and played intramural hockey, softball and water polo. Intensely interested in flying, Roger had gained his Private Pilot's license on a flying scholarship won through Air Cadets. In Webster Trophy competitions, he was judged the best junior pilot in the Martime Provinces. Joining the University Reserve of the R.C.A.F., he achieved a goal in being accepted for air crew.

For those of us who knew Roger, this was a tragic loss. His outstanding character and qualities of leadership made him a very respected member of the circle in which he moved.


