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Again brushing all this aside and coming to my now famous speech of November 16th, 1928, on the orders - to borrow bond coupons and other questions - which was heralded by all the Canadian press, you will recall that during my speech you left your seat and spoke to two or three Honorable Members behind you and you stated - to use your own expression - "After all this is a serious House." Should you desire, I think I could produce them as witnesses to my statement. Do you think that was a courteous move during a speech which was anything but a Mark Twain exercise? I can assure
