MIMORANDUM TO:

THE WAR COMMITTER OF THE CABINET.

Under the authority granted by Order-in-Council P.C. 6846 dated 20th July, 1948, two Canadian Long Range Mavigation Stations have been constructed at Baccare Point and Deming Island, Nova Scotia, which comprise a critical link in the Northwest Atlantic Loren system and are of the utmost importance to shipe and aircraft of the United Nations, both new and in the postwar period.

The cost of the equipment for these stations and the buildings to house the equipment were provided by the Government of the United States of America. The land, accommodation for personnel, power and telephone facilities and other similar services have been provided by the Royal Canadian Navy.

It was the intention that the stations be manned and operated initially by United States technicians but that eventually their manning and operation would be the responsibility of the Royal Canadian Havy. Accordingly, the United States Havy Department turned ever the equipment and equipment buildings to the Royal Canadian Havy onto no-charge basis in December, 1945, on the understanding that Canadian Would assume complete responsibility for the Canadian Stations. The question of the status of these stations, insofar as the transfer of equipment by the United States Haval authorities to the Royal Canadian Havy is emerged, has been the matter of correspondence with the Union-Secretary of State for External Affairs, and that Department has advised that Vice-Admiral A. W. Johnson, Senior United States Haval Hember, Canada-United States Fernanent Joint Board on Defence, considers that there is sufficient evidence of authority for the material in question to be turned over to the Royal Canadian Havy without charge. The original equipment designed by the United States National Defence Research Committee in 1942 and which is still used in these stations, is now obsolute and inefficient in operation and the equipment buildings, which are Quanset buts, are unsuitable for housing new equipment which it is proposed to acquire. This new equipment is required to bring the Canadian Stations to a level of maximum efficiently and to conform with the agreed station standard for Leran networks and has been recommended following R.C.N. - U.S.N. Leran Standardization Conformaces.

The total estimated cost of this proposed modernization programme is \$256,000.00 made up as follows:

Loran Station, Deming, N.S. \$20,000.00 \$98,000.00 \$118,000.00

The Chief of the Naval Staff has recommended that the obligation of the Royal Canadian Navy to operate these stations be recognized and that authority be granted to proceed with the above described modernization programs.
