Sir, -

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your favour of the 28th inst., enclosing a letter from L. F. Jackson, with reference to the estate of the late Thomas Daillebout, and your subsequent letter of the 27th, enclosing a form for registration of burial of the deceased.

I note in Mr. Jackson's letter that the late Thomas Daillebout left six surviving children and three grandchildren, and property consisting of a house and lot and a five-acre plot, and I also note the transactions in regard to this property, which appear to be illegal; also that the widow would like this property divided, and that the late Thomas Daillebout, uncle of the minors, is suggested for the position of guardian.

In reply I beg to say that the Department would be glad to have you ascertain who is in possession of this property at the present time, and, if it is rented, what the annual proceeds amount to, and whether the widow would prefer to have the property divided now or whether she requires the use of it until her children are of age.
