## A TRIUMPH FOR TRUTH.

Without declaring in favor of Japan's contentions, it can be said in a most important sense that the success of the Japs in the present war is a triumph of truth, points out the Toronto News.

When we think for a single moment of the vast and complex operations necessary to put an army in the field and maintain it as an effective force, we see that both sides in this great contest have performed absolute miracles of organization. The arm-chair critic may sneer at Russia for the defeats she has suffered, but the fact remains that she has transported hundreds of thousands of men speedily over a new railway, has massed them in fighting array at points about six thousand miles from her capital, has kept them in food and equipment, and has maintained them as an effective organization until now. At the same time, she has sent a magnificent fleet half-way around the world to meet the enemy in his own waters in a vain hope of breaking his control of the sea. The men who could do such things as these are worthy of honor individually and as a nation.

High above any virtue that the Russians have shown, however, shines the glorious honesty with one another of the little Japs. They also had their great problems of transport and supply. Every battle, every move in preparation for battle, has gone to prove that the Japs, from the Mikado to the man whose business it was to feed one of the army mules, have done their work in dependable, workmanlike fashion. Not a man among them, apparently, has scamped his work or in any way lied to those who were depending upon the service he was to render. It is not merely that the men who were sent out to get themselves killed did that part of the business effectively—that sort of "grandstand play" has been the choice morsel for the soldier throughout all generations—but the man who was told to carry a bag of rice to a given point must have carried the whole bag to that point, the man who was set to add up columns of figures must have added them up correctly, and so on with every little duty, however unimportant or however easy it may have been for him to shirk with impunity.

The result has been that the men at the head, whose business it was to organize and calculate a victory, have been able to figure closely. The question whether a certain brigade could reach a given point in a given time may have made all the difference. It is evident that every brigade, and every corps, reached the point it was due to reach, that it reached there on schedule time and ready for the work it was to do. The teachers who brought up the Japs to be honest with one another are the real victors in this war.

**Self Protecting Plants.**  
Plants protect themselves much the same as insects. One of the uses of the movements of the sensitive plant is to frighten animals. The drops of honey which bees and insects fancy they see inside the petals are solid, glassy imitations of honey, which fool the bees, which are lured in this way that they may carry off the pollen to other blossoms and are held fast until they die.

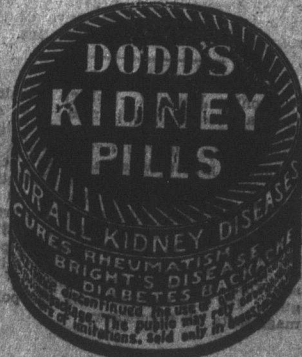
