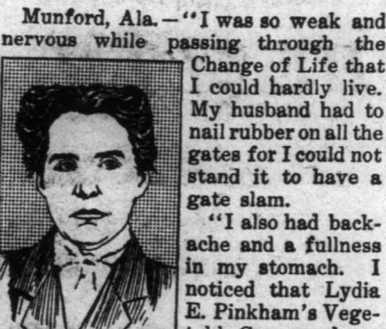

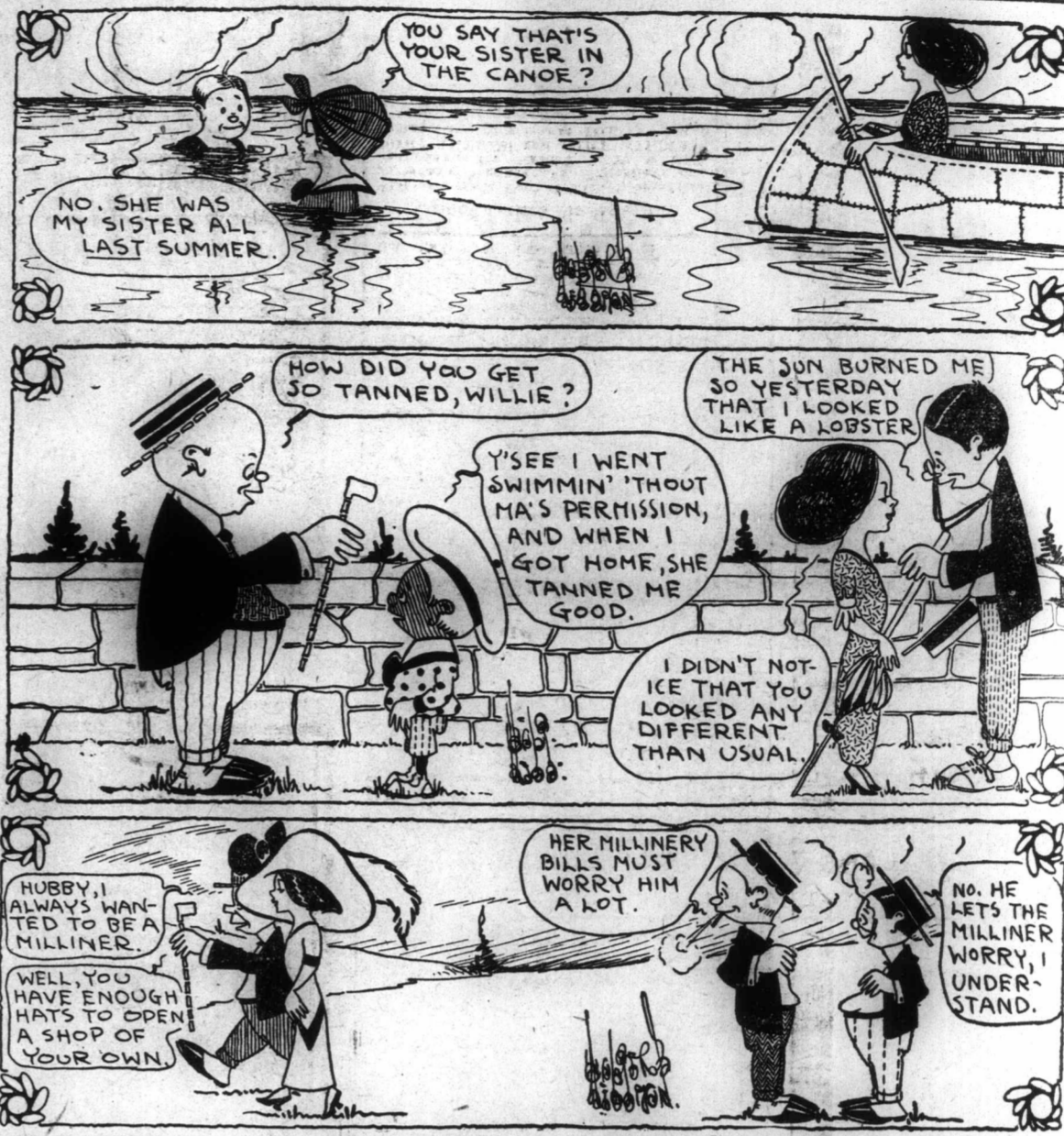

MILVERTON, Ont., July 22.—A sad tragedy took place in Wainwright township yesterday afternoon, when the home of Mr. Thomas Crumley, a highly respected farmer living five miles east of Milbank, was broken up by the death of a four-year-old son, Roy, who had been suffering from typhoid fever. His wife, Mrs. Mary Crumley, is a widow, and she has two other children, a son and a daughter, both of whom are recovering from typhoid fever. The doctor, Mr. J. H. Miller, who is in charge of the health of the township, says that the case is a very serious one, and that the child's death is a great loss to the family.

Two Militants Are Arrested

They Were Caught in Act of Setting Fire to a Mansion.

GLASGOW, Scotland, July 23.—Two suffragettes, Margaret and another woman, who gave their names, were arrested today when at the point of setting fire to a large mansion in a Glasgow suburb, which was at the residence of the late Sir John Lorimer provost. The attention of the police was attracted to the house, and when they found a woman inside a match in her hand in one pile of combustibles which had been placed at the doors, afterward Margaret Morrison, a chimney which was covered with scaffolding. A quantity of scaffolding was found in the house.

Attempt on Asquith. DONCASTER, Eng., July 23.—An attempt by a militant suffragette, Margaret Morrison, to assassinate Premier Asquith on his way to-day to the town of Morley, Yorkshire, to receive the Freedom of the city, was frustrated. Miss Key-Jones, a well-known suffragette of this city, sprang the Premier's car and shot her. She was arrested and taken to the police station.
