Hospitals In Montreal Tied Up For Water

Serious State of Affairs Resulting From the Breaking of Water Main.

(Canadian Press Despatch) MONTREAL, Dec. 27.—Two hospitals, the Western and Royal Victoria, were this morning compelled to put out their fires owing to lack of water in their heating plant caused by the break in the intake pipe of the municipal waterworks on Christmas Day. The same thing is being done in many of the big buildings, as there is grave danger of an explosion in the dry radiators. In the hospitals nurses and doctors are going around in great coats, while most of the offices when the heat failed closed up.

To add to the distress caused by the failure of the water supply, the temperature, which has been very mild up to now, this morning tumbled to nearly zero. This seriously hampered the work of those delivering water to the affected districts in carts. Frequently the water would be frozen before it could be given out.

The advice of Mayor Lavallee that manufacturing plants be closed down has been generally taken, the fact that to-day is Saturday, a short work day, and to-morrow Sunday, alleviating the distress that would otherwise have followed a laying off of men immediately after a holiday.

The railways were experiencing trouble in getting water for their locomotives this morning, as the cisterns they have depended upon till now are all exhausted.

The hotels practically overcame the difficulty of the water, famine by buying all the aeriated and distilled water they could find, and supplying each of the rooms with a pitcher, at the same time asking guests to drink as little of it as possible.

This morning the gravest danger from the shortage, next to fire, seemed to the city officials to be that from pestilence owing to sanitary troubles. Urgent notices were issued warning people of this.

Part of the retaining wall running south from the bridge has been completed, and cement is being poured for the abutment at the canal headgates. The space between the retaining wall and the steel piles on the north side of the bridge, is being filled in by Secord & Sons.

Spalding, R.C.D., has been detailed to conduct classes in the 25th Bant Dragoons for 12 weeks, concluding the third week in March. Sergt. Spalding will report here on the 5th proximo. This will give an opportunity for those going up for portion C, which commences March 30, to prepare themselves for portion A and B, which must be passed before portion C can be taken. Two classes will be conducted next week.

Baseball Cleanings Quarters of the C

Doc Green, former trainer of the Boston Red Sox, who was released by Joe Quirk under Jimmie McAlle again has been chosen trainer.

The Louisville Club, of the American Association, has asked for \$25,000 on Al Burchett. Offered by the Pacific Coast League.

Manager Mike Lynch, of the Spokane Indians, has signed Danny Shea former catcher for the Victoria team of the Northwest League, who was released by Spokane.

The Spokane Club, of the Northwest League, has secured the services of Walter Croll, a third-baseman from California. While playing semi-pro ball, Croll averaged well as a heavy hitter.

Lacy D. Maree, catcher, and George Fritz pitcher, have signed contracts with the Bloomington Club. The three acquisitions have averaged well in semi-pro baseball.

The sum of \$1,500 is needed to insure the safety of the Vancouver Central Association, franchise. The sum of \$2,500 has been subscribed, but is asked that the stipulated sum be raised immediately.

John Henry, catcher for the Washington Senators, has been appointed chief coach of the Amherst hockey team. Henry was graduated from Amherst in 1910 and while attending college, was one of the best hockey players in the school.

Tony Marhefka, shortstop, has been sold by the Wilmington Club, of the Tri-State League to the New England League. Marhefka batted for a .258 average last season and led Tri-State shortstops in fielding.

Dan Howley, the catcher who was with the Phillies during the early weeks of the 1913 schedule, and who farmed to the Montreal club of the International League, will not go to the Coast next season as it has been announced.

The St. Paul Club, of the American Association has added George Whir, a right-hander to the 1914 payroll. Whir comes from San Mateo, California, and is reported as a catching wonder. He is six feet tall and performed well while hurling along the coast.
