

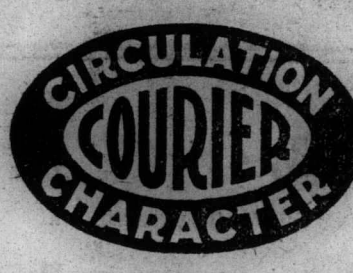

Q—Will I go back to my old place. Will we sell. Will my brother come home. Will my friend come back.—E.J.F.

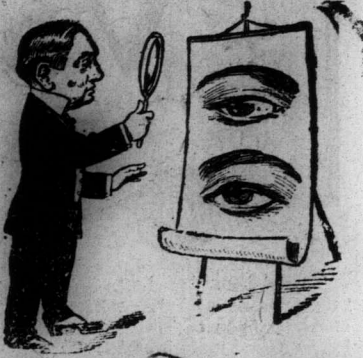
