Fire Again Visits Waterdown

At an early hour last Sunday morning Waterdown residents had visions of a repetition of the disastrous fire which destroyed the centre of the town last summer. About 4 o'clock fire was discovered in the barn owned by Mrs. A. M. Slater on Mill street, and when first seen was beyond control of a few. An alarm was immediately sent in and the prompt response to the call no doubt prevented another burned district in the village. Sparks from the burning building set fire to the roof of Knox Sunday School and did several hundred dollars damage. Chief Copp realizing the danger called on Hamilton and Burlington for assistance, and placing men on all roofs in the vicinity with pails of water and a number in and around Slater's lumber yards prevented the fire from spreading as several times sparks ignited some roof or lumber pile but was quickly extinguished by those on guard.

The Burlington Brigade made a record run and arrived shortly after the fire was under control. Upon arrival of Chief James of the Hamilton department and seeing no more danger sent word to his men and they returned to the city before reaching the village. He highly complimented our Chief and his men on the splendid work done in handling the fire and remarked that Waterdown had the best lot of fire fighter he knew of.

The fire is supposed to have been caused by defective wiring in an automobile which was in the barn, the building, ear and other contents were completely destroyed. William Carson suffered a broken ankle caused by the breaking of a ladder while he was in the act of carrying a hose to the roof of Knox church. The others on the ladder at the time escaped injury.

The ringing of every phone in the village and vicinity by Manager Burns of the Bell Telephone Co. added greatly in arousing people to the danger and proved very effective in night alarms.

Chief Copp reports that about 30 of the fire pails are still out and requests that they be returned to the fire hall. These pails have red bands and are all stamped W. F. D. which makes them easily recognized.
