AN UNWISE CRITICISM.

### THE ILLEGAL FISHING DEPLETES THE SUPPLY

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 19.—The state of affairs in the export fish trade, revealed by the work of the fishery overseers at this point, has aroused deep indignation. Not a week has passed this spring without several seizures of fish in transit from Canadian points to the markete of the United States. At all, sorts of unexpected times the overseers appear at the railway stations and open cases of fish being taken kthrough on trains. Very few shipments are found to be all right. In nearly every instance some boxes are found to contain fish which are out of season or under-sized. These boxes are confiscated and the fish disposed of. The number of boxes seized at of season of the transfer of the number of boxes seized at one inspection varies from one to 55. Some large seizures have also been made at Bridgeburg by inspectors through on trains. Very few shipsements have been seized here the shippers start to send their fish to Buffalo via Bridgeburg. Then the inspectors go up there and make another big haul. In a recent seizure at Bridgeburg there were a score of cases containing under-sized pickers, some of them less than six inches in length.

It is evident, the inspectors say, that Canadian waters are being mar-cilessly robucd of every sort and size of fish to feed the insatiable Ameri-can markets. Wonder has been ex-pressed that the losses sustained do not deter the fishermen from shipping under-sized fish, but it is now salaries by the United States fish companies to ship all the fish of companies to ship all the fish of every sort and size they can catch. All expenses and risks are taken by the buyers, and their losses from seizures are easily made up by a slight increase in retail prices.

Canadian fresh fish of any sort command fancy prices in Buffalo, Boston, New York and Pittsburg, but in many Canadian cities they cannot be nursheed at all. The new

Its members declare that if the Ontario law makers should come here and see for themselves what is going on such a prohibitory measure would surely be placed on the statute book at the next session.
