The distinction of being elected a Fel The distinction of being elected a Fei-low of the Royal Geographical Society has recently been achieved by Mr. C. T. Currelly, B. A., of Toronto University. In recognition of the work accomplished in connection with his book on "Sinai." He has also received an appointment, in connection with the New York Art Museum, as adviser, in regard to Egyptian antiquities, says a contemporary. Some time ago he was awarded a decoration by the Khedive, being made an officer of the Imperial Order of the Mejedieh. of the Imperial Order of the nejectem. This latter was in consequence of the great work he undertook in removing, at the request of the Egyptian Government, great tablets of stone from the face of the cliffs where the old Tarquoise miners ransacked the treasures of the rooks. These tablets dated back to thi time of Cheops, about 2,800 B. C., and contained not only archaic tapriptions, valuable from a historical point of view, but also representations of the Pharaohs, who built the pyramids.

Mr. Currelly is also a joint editor of "Abydos," the last publication of the Egyptian Exploration Society. The chapters written by him on the tomb of Senusert III., and of Ashmes I. (who was the founder of the eighteenth dynasty, and the conqueror of the Hyknos), and also that part of the book devoted to the Shrine of Tets Shers, "The Great Queen and Royal Mother," are particularly interesting. Mr. Currelly has thus been made the recipient of English, American and Egyption honors, and brings much learning and experience to his new position relative to the Museum of the University of Toronto.


