OATH BOUND PLUMBERS

166 of Them to Stand by Each Other in Trade Secrecy.

How the Public Were Bled—Rake-Off on Contracts, Some of Them as High as \$200, Paid to Members of the Association—Claiming a Customer—Hard to Get Supplies Under the Rules.

Toronto, Nov. 18.—At the opening of the trial of the Central Supply Co. of Canada, Limited, and the Master Plumbers' Association of Toronto, before Mr. Justice Clute, in the Criminal Assizes, yesterday, without a jury, on the indictment for conspiracy in restraining trade in plumbers' supplies, it was brought out that the master plumbers were bound by oath to preserve the secrecy of the doings of their association. The document was signed by 166 master plumbers.

The Understanding. Thomas A. Stevens, manager of the Empire Manufacturing Co. of London, admitted that he was a member of the Supply Association and had been since its incorporation, and of the Central Supply Co., which was not incorporated, and before that the Plumbers' Supply Association. The books for these three associations were produced as having been found in the offices of the present supply company's offices.

"What was the written agreement between the Master Plumbers and the Supply Co.?" asked Mr. DuVernet.

"There was no agreement of that kind that I know of," answered the witness.

"Will you say there was no understanding?"

"No."

"What was the understanding then?"

"If we supplied non-association master plumbers, we were likely to lose the trade of the Master Plumbers. Our name would be struck off their list and they would buy supplies elsewhere."

Joseph Harrison, one of the dissenting master plumbers, said that his joining the association caused a reduction in his business from \$12,000 in 1902 to \$2,000 in 1903. In the first year 35 per cent. of his work came from outside points, which was prevented by rules of the association.

Rake-Off System. Harrison gave some instances of the rake-off system practiced by the association. In the contract for the Clark Lithographing Co., all those tendering received "I.O.U.'s" for \$110; for the Guelph Sanitarium, four plumbers received "I.O.U.'s" for \$300; on the Isolation Hospital, fourteen plumbers got rake-offs of \$25; on the Annesley contract, ten plumbers got \$25 each; on the Nerlich house fourteen got \$15 each; plumber got \$150 on the Dignum, Moneypenny building. These were only a few of the instances cited.

In describing the customer claims, Mr. Harrison said that he got the worst of it because he was a new member. A plumber was entitled to claim a person as his customer if he had done his work continuously for two years. This prevented competition, and stopped him from making bids for the work for men claimed by other plumbers as customers.

Hard to Get Supplies. James A. Bridge, builder, told the same story as he told in the Police Court. He told of his difficulties in obtaining supplies from William Harris, James Robertson Co., James Morrison Co., Ontario Lead and Barbed Wire Co., on April 12. At that time Mr. Porter of the latter company said he wished the Master Plumbers' Association was broken up as he was getting tired of it.

"A few days after this," continued Berridge, "after I had made a complaint to the Minister of Customs, I attempted to get some goods. The men I sent were told that the companies were closed. I wanted in a roundabout way from James Morrison Co., which was one of those asked."

Mr. Watson refused to cross-examine the witness, holding that his evidence was inadmissible. This stand the judge refused to support, holding that the actions of members of the Supply Co. was evidence against the indicted company.

The trial will go on this morning at 10 o'clock.

WAS DRIVING ON TRACK.

Melancthon Township Man Struck by

Owen Sound, Nov. 18.—W. C. Hooker, manufacturer of Augustus, Melancthon Township, was struck and badly hurt by the C. P. R. northbound train from Toronto Thursday night, about two miles south of Dundalk, while driving on the track half a mile from a crossing.

Hooker was driving towards the train and as the engineer did not see him until he was only a short distance off he could not stop the train in time to avoid a collision. The horse was killed instantly and dragged some distance in front of the engine. The whole outfit was completely demolished, and Hooker himself thrown into the ditch. When picked up he was unconscious.

Farmer's Big Fire Loss. Campbellford, Nov. 18.—Thursday night the barns and outbuildings of Ernest Cassan, a farmer near this town, were totally destroyed by fire, including twenty cows, seven horses, number of hogs and fowl, the season's crop of grain, farm implements, vehicles, etc. Loss about \$7,000; insurance \$1,500; cause of fire unknown.

Explosion Kills Fifteen. Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 18.—A special from Marion, N.C., reports that 15 men were killed near there yesterday by the explosion of a powder magazine located just outside of the town. The shock of the explosion was so great that it was felt at Morgantown, 21 miles away.

Police Chief Missing. Paris, Nov. 18.—Chief of Police MacFarlane is missing. He has been engaged in collecting poll and dog taxes, but the council is secured by a bond is a guarantee company.
