## FROM THE SEAT OF WAR

Many Small Engagements in Which the Boers Were Invariably Defeated.

The Boer Invasion of Cape Colony Has Not Proved a Profitable Undertaking.

### OPERATIONS NOW UNDER WAY.

CAPETOWN, July 4.—The Boer invasion in Fransh has apparently completely failed. Fouché's commando hastily retreating over the Drakenstein range. British scouts are following the Boers into the mountain passes. Seymour and Culbertson recently located commandos at Katherg, and Winthberg. The Boers finding the British were alert retired. Laigard's commando passed through Eladinsfontein, twenty seven miles from Richmond, yesterday. Boers are reported active, but in small numbers in Naaswpoort district, where there has been some conspiring. Boers attacked a post near Barkley West yesterday, but were repulsed and fled, burning their convey to prevent its capture. The British are pursuing them. Baden Powell III. DURBAN, July 4.—Parliament is discussing and is likely to pass a resolution declaring that it is desirable to adopt legislation that will allow any municipality to acquire exclusive right to sell liquor. Practically all the Scottish Horse have decided to continue service. Baden Powell has arrived here. He is indisposed and is going home, but will return. Four hundred and fifty Boer prisoners have embarked for Bermuda.

## THE GREAT HENLEY REGATTA.

Americans Won Their Second Heat and Will Meet British Champions To-morrow.

HENLEY, July 4.—The second day of the Henley regatta, which ends to-morrow, was signalled by another victory for the Americans. The oarsmen of the University of Pennsylvania defeated the Thames Rowing Club, thus winning their second race. As the leaders defeated the Belgian crew the Pennsylvanians will meet the Leaders in the final heat for the grand challenge cup to-morrow. The results of the heats today were as follows: Grand Challenge Cup—Third Heat—The Leander Rowing Club beat the Belgians crew by three quarters of a length. Time 8:11. Fourth heat—Pennsylvania University beat the Thames Rowing Club by three lengths. Time 7:32. Thames Challenge Cup—Kingston Rowing Club beat the Royal School of Mines by a length and a half. Time, 7:24. Ninth heat—Trinity Hall, Cambridge, beat Worcester College, Oxford, by a length. Time, 7:30. Visitors Challenge Cup—Second heat—Caius College, Cambridge, beat New College, Oxford. Caius arrived alone. Number 3 of the New College broke his slide. Caius stopped, but the damage could not be repaired. Third heat—Balliol College, Oxford, beat First Trinity, Cambridge, by two lengths. Time 8:11.

### MANITOBA CROPS.

The Farmers Jubilant Over the Bright Prospects.

The Greatest Crop in History of the Province.

Harvesting Will Begin Early in August Before Frost Appears.

WINNIPEG, July 4.—Reliable reports from all parts of the Province and Territories indicate that crop conditions are ideal, and farmers claim this to be the most promising year in the history of Manitoba. All danger from drought has now passed and no damage is reported from any source. Hay, which will be cut during the next fortnight, is abundant, and coarser grains are on a par with wheat. The latter is heading out and farmers are confident that harvest will begin about August 1. This practically ensures against all danger from frost, which has never been known in July or the early part of August. Manitoba this year has over two million acres under wheat, and good authorities think twenty bushels per acre a conservative estimate.

### RUN INTO A WHALE.

The Strange Experience of a Schooner in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

QUEBEC, July 4.—The schooner Saig, which has just arrived, had a rather unpleasant experience in the Gulf. When near Tabatiere a large whale collided with the schooner, causing a terrific shock, as though it was in collision with another vessel. The monstrous creature came partly out of the water, but almost immediately dived again and disappeared.

Newspapers represent Baldwin as saying before his departure in reference to the Deauville car which he is taking with him that if the ice is at all practicable for motor driving he will make a dash on it. Anyhow the motor will be heard from far within the Arctic circle.

VIENNA, July 4.—The Common Council of Lower Austria are considering a proposition to forbid the sale of American boots and shoes, on the ground that such sales are ruining the home industries.
