

## Toronto People Go to Peach Orchards and Fill Baskets With the Fruit for 25 Cents

The Fruit Growers Declare That They Get More Profit for Their Fruit in This Way Than in Shipping to the Cities—Baskets Cost Them 20 Cents Each

[Canadian Press by Leased Wire.] Toronto, Oct. 4.—The Toronto Globe this morning publishes the following special despatch from St. Catharines, dated yesterday:

Today in answer to the advertised invitation of fruit farmers, people went with their baskets to the peach orchards and got eleven quarts of the best fruit for 25 cents. Growers declare they are money in pocket this way, as by shipping peaches to Toronto and other cities they don't clear a quarter dollar a basket. Baskets cost them 20 cents each, they say. "The public would only use reasonable care and not break down the trees, they could have all my crop that way," said one grower today.

Another grower stated that he fig-

ured the cost of picking, packing, transportation and baskets on a con-

signment of peaches he sent to Tor-

onto recently, and found he was just

ten dollars out.

"I would have been money in pocket

had I left the peaches right on the

trees and let them rot," he said.

## RAILWAY WASHOUTS CAUSED BY RAINS

Edmundston, N. B., Oct. 2.—The

effect of the continued downpour of

rain is being felt by the railways in

this section. The C. P. R. north-

bound express was delayed more than

an hour last evening by a washout

near St. Leonard's and the eastbound

express on the Transcontinental was

delayed at an early hour this morning

near Thériault, about fifteen miles

south of here, by a washout and the

Maritime express which was being

brought west was held up at St. Leonard's

on account of the washout at

Thériault. Superintendent Atkinson

of the Edmundston division, showing

his usual resourcefulness in such

cases, had arranged to transfer the

trains around the washout over the

C. P. R. rails, but this was not neces-

sary as his crew had the damage re-

paired at 11 o'clock this morning and

the trains have proceeded over the

Transcontinental rails.

The St. John river has risen several

feet during the last 24 hours and logs

are running freely, giving it the ap-

pearance of a spring freshet. Rain

has continued to fall all morning and

the weather does not show any in-

dication of clearing.

## THREE TICKETS IN RESTIGOUCHE CO.

Sheriff Stewart Declared Hon. C. H. LaBillicois and W. D. Duncan "Duly Nominated"

Reports sent out from Restigouche county to the effect that Hon. C. H. LaBillicois and William D. Duncan, the Independent ticket, had been retired from the election and that only the Government and Opposition tickets remained were denied today.

Hon. Mr. LaBillicois and his colleagues are still in the field and carrying on an energetic campaign. It was said today, having a public meeting billed for tonight at Campbellton and other meetings through the constituency during the balance of the week.

It appears that when he closed his Nomination Day court on Saturday at 12 o'clock Sheriff James E. Stewart, of Restigouche, who is returning officer for that county, declared six candidates duly nominated, including Mr. LaBillicois and Mr. Duncan. During the afternoon, it is said, Sheriff Stewart's attention was drawn to the absence of the usual affidavit proving signatures of the nomination papers of Mr. LaBillicois and Mr. Duncan, but having been declared "duly nominated" by the Sheriff when he closed his court they are still in the field and say they intend to stay in the fight. The courts will have to declare the legality of their nominations.

There were no changes in the lists of candidates nominated in other constituencies, the reports as appearing in The Gleaner on Saturday being correct, and the final week of the campaign commenced today, next Saturday being polling day. Of interest in the campaign in York county will be the appearance here on Wednesday evening of Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, the Opposition leader, who is to address a public meeting that evening at the Opera House.

## CABINET DECISION ON RAILWAY RATES

[Special despatch to The Daily Gleaner.] Ottawa, Oct. 4.—The railway rates case will probably come before the cabinet tomorrow, and the expectation is that the matter will be referred back to the railway commission, possibly with the recommendation that the west be further gone into, and if discrimination is found to exist as alleged to be amended. The Premier has prepared the finding of the cabinet on the question and the judgment is understood to be a very lengthy and detailed one.
