the juice of pineapple is a cure for diputheria, and asserted further that the fact is nothing new, that the Crecles of the South have long known the value of pineapple juice in the treatment of this disease. Since the publication of this first announcement, the Tribune has printed the evidence of a number of its readers who have tried pineapple juice in the treatment of diphtheria.

One man says he administered the juice to his seven year old boy, who was in great distress for breath; and four hours thereafter the patient began to cough up the diphtheria membrane.


