A Vienna despatch says the Emperor of Austria has subscribed 5,000 florins for the relief of the districts of the Kingdom of Italy.

TROOPS DISPATCHED TO IRELAND. ORDERS RECEIVED AT PLYMOUTH AND GREENWICH FOR THE IMMEDIATE EMBARKATION OF MAINTENANCE—A MINISTERIAL EXPLANATION.

The Standard learns that the Government have resolved to send a Cabinet Council on Wednesday to inspect the military stores.

There is a report that a Plymouth correspondent asserts that an order was received on Wednesday for the Royal Marines to be held in readiness to proceed to Ireland on the 10th inst. if necessary.

The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says—The amendments are understood to be such as the House of Commons would have insisted on, and are made with a view of securing the passage of the bill through that House.

FLOODS IN GERMANY. The floods in the district of Ratibon are very serious. Over twenty villages have been destroyed, and the loss of many millions of marks has been entailed by the destruction of the harvest.

AFRICAN EXPLORERS MURDERED. A telegram from Zanzibar states that Captain Carter and Mr. Cadwallader, of the Royal Belgian exploring expedition, have been murdered by Chief Wrambo in Central Africa.

A DISOBTAINED HOME RULER. Mr. O'Donnell has protested against the Irish members of the House of Commons resigning their seats for the purpose of opposing the Compensation Bill by the House of Lords by obstruction in the Commons.

THE NEW ROSS OUTRAGE. The eleven persons arrested in connection with the New Ross outrage include two women who were seen by the witnesses to be the assassins by waving her handkerchief from a ditch.

ANOTHER IRISH OUTRAGE. A Clare woman, Galway, despatch says—It is reported that Mr. Lavelle, Justice of the Peace, has been fired at while returning from Tuam. Three bullets struck him in the neck, but without effect, as he wore a coat of mail.

POLICE ATTACK AT LIVERPOOL. A Dublin despatch says—The police of Longford have attempted to prevent the sale of arms to the Irish Volunteers, and the result was a riotous scene.

TRANSFER OF DUTY. A Constantinople despatch says—The Sultan has ordered Hussein Pasha, Minister of War, to leave for Dulcigno on the 11th inst. with 2,000 troops.

THE RIGHT HON. ANTHONY J. MUNDILLA. The Right Hon. Anthony J. Mundilla, Minister of the Interior, has been appointed to the best authority the foot and mouth disease has been stamped out in this country, and to be lax in restrictions might be to open the gates to the introduction of the disease.

WARLIKE PREPARATIONS. A Berlin correspondent says—Military preparations are the order of the day in the Balkan States. The Turks are repairing and arming the fortifications of Salonica.

A RUSSIAN SEVERES IN CENTRAL ASIA. A Kufun despatch says on July 29th a large Russian force was driven back by the Tadjiks near Quok-Tep.

AN ANGLICAN DIATRIBE. The Leipzig correspondent, supposed to be inspired by Prince Bismarck, says a dispute has arisen between Austria and England regarding the navigation of the Danube.

TORPEDOES PLACED OUT. Torpedo boats are threatened with immediate destruction by the introduction of the Nordenfled machine gun, which is capable of striking a vessel at a distance of 1,500 and 2,000 yards.

MANSLAUGHTER BY A HOSPITAL NURSE. The Central Criminal Court, Pleasney Lane, London, on Monday, convicted a nurse of manslaughter in causing the death of a young married woman, named Louisa Morgan, admitted to the institution as a consumptive.

THE REORGANIZATION OF THE ARMY. The reorganization of the army is engaging the attention of Mr. Childers, War Minister, at an important moment like the present, when it is looked upon as almost a precious moment upon it.

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GREAT BRITAIN NEWS.

A warrant is now out for a party in another locality. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bradford Young Ladies' College took place on Wednesday last.

QUEEN'S COUNTY, N.S. The demand for square timber at Quebec is larger this season than it has been for many years past.

THE OCCIDENTAL RAILWAY. The Occidental railway has added 500 new freight cars to its rolling stock, all being manufactured in Canada.

A ball from the Victoria, in which Nelson met his death, has been added to the Parliamentary museum at Ottawa.

THE FREIGHT BUSINESS. The freight business at the Halifax station of the Intercolonial Railway during last week amounted to 149 cars inward, and 150 outward.

THE INHABITANTS OF CHICOUTIMI. The inhabitants of Chicoutimi have resolved to erect a monument to Chicomoti in the memory of their late mayor, Mr. W. E. Harvey.

THE NEW YORK RAILWAY. The New York Railway is understood to be in the hands of the chief of the life-saving service to expend upon the lakes the entire appropriation of \$20,000 made last winter for the establishment of new life-saving stations.

THE STEAMER SEABIRD. The steamer Seabird, running between Red Bank, N.J., and New York, has been libelled to the amount of \$4,312 for carrying more passengers than her certificate allowed.

DAY BY DAY AMERICAN PRODUCTS. Day by day American products in European markets grow steadily in popularity, and the Department of State is endeavoring to increase their sale.

THE PACIFIC RAILWAY COMMISSION. The Pacific Railway Commission will open their work on Tuesday at 10 o'clock.

THE FISHING BOATS. The fishing boats round the coast of the Magdalen Islands are reported to be more numerous than in any previous year.

An earlier British Defeat and Rout. BAGGAGE AND TREASURE CHEST LOST.

Troops Moving to the Relief of Candahar. PREPARATIONS FOR ITS DEFENCE.

Discontent Among Ayoub Khan's Followers. LONDON, Aug. 10.

A Cabul despatch says—Gen. Roberts' exact force for the relief of Candahar is 2,636 Europeans, 7,128 Afghans, and 8,000 camp followers.

A despatch from Quetta reports that another detachment of British troops is retiring from the line of railway upon Sit and a large body of tribesmen.

A despatch just received from Lord Ripon states that the erection of the military railway below Hama is completed.

Sir pair of carrier pigeons, belonging to Charles Dietrich and J. Nichols, of Brooklyn, were freed from their boxes at Long Branch at 9.30 on Friday morning for flight home.

The funeral of Balbo, the executed murderer, took place at New York on Saturday morning.

A despatch from Quetta dated August 6th says—The defensive works have been completed, and there are provisions in store for thirty-five days.

A Bombay despatch says the latest advices from Candahar are dated Monday and are to the effect that the British force is in the city with its relations.

A despatch from the Viceroy of India to the War Office to-day states that he has received a telegram from General Sandeman, dated Quetta, Aug. 4th, regarding the capture of Candahar.

Information comes from Texas that what is known as the "Grand Army of Occupation" organization, which has for its object the invasion of Mexico, is assuming considerable proportions.

The United States Cavalry, which is being organized at Austin, is commanded by General Armstrong.

Mr. D. D. Croft, M.P.P. for Frontenac, is serving his term in prison.

Michael Davit, the Irish land agitator, is now in New York, and will visit Montreal in October.

Meers, Rager and Curtis, of the British agricultural delegation to Canada, are now making a tour through Ontario.

The Major General Leard has bought Rockhill, on the shore of Lake Charles, on the Ottawa river.

A Berlin correspondent asserts that the Comte de St. Valentin, formerly Minister of Agriculture in Germany, has definitely tendered his resignation on account of ill-health.

A Thomas, the young man who recently accomplished the feat of carrying a barrel of iron on his head, has travelled most of the distance by hand car.

An Ottawa firm has shipped to Quebec the remains of the late Hon. Thomas McGrew.

Sir Arthur Gardner, Governor of the Fiji Islands, will succeed Sir Herschel Robinson as Governor of New Zealand.

The Hon. Jas. Stanbee has resigned his position as President of the Honorable Board of Trade, and has been appointed to be a member of the Executive Council.

Mr. George W. Lewis, who has been absent from the city for 17 months, has just returned home.

It is understood that the celebrated champion of the extreme high church party in England, Rev. Alan McKennon, of St. Alban, London, will arrive in Montreal on the 24th inst.

The attempt of the Paris authority to dispose of the sewage of that city by the irrigation of lands has been successful.

The Spanish are about to seek to appease the wrath of Europe at their Cuban barbarities by offering to give up the colonies.


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
