INQUEST AT UPSALQUITCH

Jury Return Verdict of Accidental Death—Attach no Blame to International Railway or its Servants.

An inquest on the body of James Thomas was held at Upsalquitch on Friday last before the Coroner, Dr. Martie. Deceased met his death on the I. N. R. track, about half a mile from the station, being run over by the express from St. Leonard's to Campbellton on the evening of Tuesday, 25th April. The evidence showed that the deceased, along with some others, had been drinking heavily that day and no one could throw any light on the accident. It was conjectured that deceased on making for the house of one of his friends along the track, might have fallen and stunned himself or have fallen asleep between the rails where the body was found. He was last seen by Mrs. McKinnon, wife of the station master, sitting near the bridge, and she advised him to go home and have a sleep. The driver and fireman on the express saw no one on the rails, but at the spot where the body was found, the driver saw what he thought was a pile of ashes or dirt between the rails. The train was travelling at the rate of between 20 and 25 miles an hour and no jolt or jar was felt on the engine, which would indicate that someone had been run over. Before the evidence was taken the coroner and jury with Mr. A. E. G. MacKenzie, who watched the case on behalf of the I. N. R., viewed the body and the scene of the fatality. On the conclusion of the evidence the coroner gave his charge to the jury, who in a short time, returned the following verdict: "That the said James Thomas was found dead on the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year 1911, in the Parish of Eldon, in the County of Restigouche, that he was killed by a train of the International Railway, while lying on the track of the said railway, between the rails; that no blame attaches to the driver or crew of the said train or anyone else for the death of the said James Thomas."

MOTHER'S DAY

A movement which has proved a popular one is that of observing the second Sunday in May as Mothers' Day by wearing a white carnation. Although only started last year already it has spread widely. In Canada the sponsor for the movement is W. G. Rook of Toronto, President of Canadian Home Journal. He is receiving cordial assistance from the press and the pulpit.
