HOW TO BEAUTIFY NEWCASTLE

What Spring Means In a Flower Garden

Grass Edges Upon Which Neatness Depends Are One of First Things Given Attention—Margins of Turf Between Paths and the Flower Beds.

At this time of year outdoor operations become imperative and one of the first things that the gardener attends to is the grass edges upon which the neatness of a garden so largely depends. Where there are straight edges to the turf along paths and flower beds a certain amount of irregularity is always produced by the breaking down of the sides by walking or by gardening through the year. To repair the damage a string should be stretched between two pegs tracing a line a little behind the indentations and then a new cut made with a spade or "half-moon" so as to leave a clean edge.

This process, of course, gradually encroaches on the turf area year by year and after a time it may be necessary to bring it back to its original alignment with a strip of fresh sods. Unnecessarily narrow margins of turf between paths and flower beds should be avoided, because they do not leave enough room for this trimming process to be tidily carried out. Those edges which do not require trimming with a spade will probably be the better for a careful clipping of the rough grass along the margin. The next thing is to correct the contour of the beds. During the time that has elapsed since they were cultivated last year they have probably become more or less reduced to a level with the surrounding turf; if so the soil should be taken from the sides and placed upon the center until it assumes the slightly arched shape considered best for drainage. The edges should spring from the bottom of the vertically cut turf and the center should be well above the grass level.

A neat edging between beds and paths, which has the double advantage of being ever green and at the same time preventing the splashing of the earth on to the gravel in heavy rain, is made of Box. The Box is an accommodating species. From its natural state a tree some 20 feet high, it descends without objection to acting as a five-foot hedge or a five-inch border, or even to being clipped into all kinds of absurd shapes of birds and bears. In all it thrives equally well. For bordering garden beds cuttings about five inches long are taken from bushes in early autumn and set in pans to root during the winter in a sheltered place; or if established dwarf plants are available they may conveniently be propagated by division. In either case the plants are set out in the spring as firmly and as deeply as possible at such distances as will produce a continuous thick border, and the process concluded by a copious watering.

There is much pruning of roses or other shrubs in spring. The early flowering ones are always pruned in the cold weather. Late flowering shrubs should be trimmed into shape; tender roses should be pruned back to within a foot of the ground every spring until they form large bushes, when cutting may be confined to the removal of the oldest wood. In the case of young plants each shoot should be cut off just above a bud which faces away from the center of the bush so that the resulting branches may not be interlaced. In pruning vines all the wood that has lost its usefulness for flowering should be removed and also enough of the remainder to reduce the bulk of very strong growing specimens to convenient proportions for the coming season.

The first Gladiolus bulbs should be put in the ground now, and as they harmonize well with roses and thrive in the same kind of soil, it is a good plan to locate them in the rose beds. If about three weeks later another lot of bulbs are set out and so on at regular intervals, a succession of flowers may be secured.

As soon as it is warm enough the seedlings of perennials destined for next year's flowering should, if large enough, be planted out in a bed specially reserved for the purpose and to be kept free from disturbance during this season while the plants get well rooted and develop their crowns of leaves ready to produce flowers in 1916. If there are perennials or biennials already matured from last year or if it is decided to purchase plants or to exchange with friends the specimens so obtained may now be set out in the places where they are to stay, due regard, of course, being paid to their size, form and to the color of their flowers, so as to combine harmoniously with the other plants.

It is, perhaps, unnecessary to say that biennials and perennials are quite distinct in their methods of development from each other and from annuals and require different garden

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
