

Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIM-SELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a

defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUES-TION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPEC-TION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in clearly understood that the Canadian Registration default under the Military Service Act. REGULATIONS.

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"106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Korce, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act of Regulations, or any prockamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on aumentary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than one Hundred Dollars, and off not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he made due inquiry and that THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERE ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS IN-SPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and papers that the man was stiffaction or requirements.
