### Warm Debate Over Abolition of all Titles

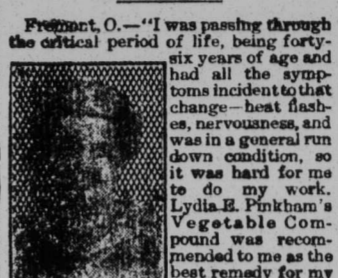

Ottawa, May 22.—The report of the titles committee recommending abolition of all titular distinctions in Canada, medals for military service alone to be excepted, came under an exceptionally heavy fire in the Commons today. Two months ago the House appeared to be in a super democratic mood, prepared to abolish titles without any qualification whatsoever. But today it was in a much more conservative mood and, while still antagonistic to hereditary honors, produced strong support for the retention of knighthoods and other lesser distinctions. The debate was sharp, spirited and generally upon a high plane of wit and eloquence. Sir Thomas White added interest and independence to the discussion by declaring that the question was not a party one, and that members were free to vote and speak without regard to the whims of party whips. This they proceeded to do with a vim. Unionists and Oppositionists being sadly mixed in the fight for and against the report. In the forefront of the fight against the anti-titles men was that sturdy radical Mr. Michael Clark, of Red Deer, who declared the report to be an "embodiment of democratic cant and illogical nonsense." Dr. Clark found an unexpected ally in Mr. D. D. McKenzie who, although opposed to hereditary titles, saw no harm in knighthoods and other honors and said frankly that he was opposed to any petition being sent to the King. After the debate ebbed and flowed for and against the report an amendment was moved by Mr. Nicholson of Algona, the effect of which would be to abolish hereditary titles only. The discussion continued under the amendment until late into the evening when a vote was taken.

The report of the committee recommending abolition of titles was carried by a vote of 96 to 43.

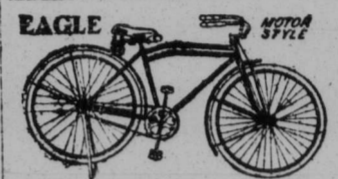
