THE PRINCE IN IRELAND.

Great Excitement Throughout the Emer-  
ald Isle.

(Continued from page 8.)  
A RUCTION AT MALLOW.

LONDON, April 13.—There was a terri-  
ble row at Mallow junction, county Cork,  
this afternoon on the arrival of the  
Prince and Princess of Wales from Dub-  
lin on their way to visit the Earl of Lis-  
towel at Cavanmore. A large crowd  
broke through the police lines and were  
driven back at the point of the bayonet.  
Messrs. O'Brien, Redmond and Harring-  
ton, Irish members of parliament, were  
in the crowd and were badly mauled.  
Ever since the riot the government has  
monopolized the telegraph wires and no  
further details are obtainable. The news  
of the disturbance caused intense excite-  
ment in the house of commons.

The chief organizer of the demonstra-  
tion at the price at Mallow was  
O'Brien, M. P., editor of United Ire-  
land. In an interview this evening,  
O'Brien said: "My object is accom-  
plished. I have shown the special re-  
porters who accompany the Prince of  
Wales the true Irish view of his visit,  
and have vindicated Ireland's name by  
showing its inhospitality to intruders.
