

HIS USE OF THE WORD "INSOLENCE" REJECTED.

mons-Mr. Chapleau on the Cost of the Franchise Act-The Distillers' Rebate on Corn Attacked-The Bual Language

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—The debate on Dr. Wilson's motion to repeal the Franchise Act has not yet been completed. On Thursday Mr. Chapleau discussed the question of behalf of the government. Referring to the cost of the Act he said that by reason of his ill-health he had not been able to carry out certain recommendations to reduce the cost. certain recommendations to reduce the cost, but in future it would be less. The revision of 1889, almost completed, had cost to date only \$150,000, though the newspapers had in addition received \$9,000 for printing lists. The debate was continued by Mr. Casey, and other members till after 11 o'clock. Sir John Macdonald wanted to press the motion to a vote, but on Mr. Laurier stating there was no chance of finishing up in any reasonable time, the Premier gave way, and Mr. Trow moved the adjournment of the debate, which carried.

On Friday, after the usual introduction of On Friday, after the usual introduction of private bills, Mr. Laurier made complaint that the House was not going into committee of supply, in which case he had an amendment to move. He had proposed to move it on Thursday last, but at the request of the Finance Minister, for a good reason then stated, he had deferred making his motion. He thought it was unfair to deprive him of an opportunity to-day. The amendment he proposed to move, was for the abolition of the rebate to distillers, of the duty paid upon corn rebate to distillers, of the duty paid upon corn used in whiskey exported.

Sir John Macdonald said that it would be very ungenerous on the part of the Govern-ment to act unfairly towards Mr. Laurier, who always showed a disposition to be per-fectly fair towards the Government in his actions. He did not think it well that the House should be moved into committee on Friday if there was to be a division, because there were so many members always away on that evening. He therefore thought it best that Mr. Laurier's amendment should not be moved until the next Government day (Tuesday). As there was a notice on the order paper, put there by the member for Frontenac, which might lead Mr. Laurier to fear that he would be forestalled in his mo-tion, Sir John would assure him that that would not occur, and he would promise that when other business was finished that day the House would be moved into supply, so that he could moved his amendment and let the discussion stand over. Mr. Laurier said that

would be quite satisfactory. The House then went into committee on Sir John Thompson's bill to amend the act respecting bills of exchange, checks and pronissory notes.

After several legal gentlemen had spoken

in defence of the present fees and Mr. Burdett had asked that their testimony be ruled out because they were bank solicitors. Mr. Lister as a bank solicitor himself, admitted that the fees in Ontario were quite large enough already, and Dr. Sproule concurred in the complaint that the cost was too large.
