The miners of the Forest of Dean district have adopted a resolution to return to work on April 1st. The ranks of non-union workers in Scotland have received large accessions. From several colleries which have reopened a number of steamers on the Firth of Forth have succeeded in obtaining coal enough to leave port with cargoes, but elsewhere many vessels are lying idle. At Cardiff. Barry and Penarth there are more than 200 steamers laid up.
