"With General Approval."

We observe that the Daily News states that the appointment of Capt. Fitzpatrick to succeed the late Mr. Edward Sinnott, as sub-collector of Customs at Placentia will meet with general approval. No doubt, the wish is father to the thought, and the Tory morning organ hopes that the appointment will rouse no resentment. In the meantime, there can be no doubt that the appointment is a great relief to the Tory authorities that, as Capt. Fitzpatrick has of late been by no means the warm and enthusiastic supporter of the Placentia Party that he was three or four years ago. It is a somewhat singular feature of a number of the late appointments and promotions that they have fallen to the lot of those who at the time of the elections were stalwart supporters, but who latterly have lost their enthusiasm for the Morris Government, and in a number of cases have not been backward in plain-speaking as to what they thought of those whom they claim had gone back on them and on the general unpopularity which the Government has earned throughout the country. No wonder indeed that the Government shirked the issue squarely laid before them and the challenge given to them by the P. P. U. members to face the country this fall, which challenge was endorsed in the House of Assembly by Sir R. Bond. It would have been awkward, would it not have allowed the country an opportunity of having a say at the polls on what voters think of Mr. Morrison's connection with land grants and deals. Would it have met with general approval from the Electorate?

Interest Was Lukewarm.

LONDON, To-day. No great political project was ever debated in the House of Commons with less display of interest on the part of members and the general public than the Home Rule Bill. Speeches were delivered to a half empty House. A few Irish priests were the only spectators in the galleries who appeared particularly concerned with what was passing on the floor. Even oratorical performances, with Churchill, who is rated the most brilliant of the younger politicians of either party as the star, created hardly any enthusiasm. No more remarkable contrast than was presented by this situation and the fierce battles over the other Home Rule Bills, when statesmen like Gladstone, Parnell, Chamberlain, Hartington, fought bitterly over inch of the ground, where racial and party passion were stirred to their depths, could possibly be conceived. One reason for this is the present new system whereby the House of Lords may prolong the legislation over a period of two years. Another is the nature of the Conservative opposition bill which, except on the part of representatives of Ulster, is generally lukewarm. Lord Hamilton, Unionist, made a bellicose speech against the bill declaring if it passed and his brother would take their stand with the people of Ulster. He should only have to go to the quayside at Liverpool to call for volunteers, he said, "to get thousands of men ready to go to the succor of their brethren in Ulster."

This occupied till 1.15 o'clock, and the matter was then adjourned till to-morrow.

Leslie Grossmith

HUMORIST—MUSICIAN.

Born in Birmingham, and reared in Australia, Leslie Grossmith commenced his musical studies at an early age. It was always his parents for permission to go on the stage as a comedian. Although he worked hard as a musician, the humorist was always prevalent. In 1885 he gave his first important concert at the Melbourne Athenaeum, appearing as solo pianist, composer and conductor. After performing one of his serious compositions he slyly introduced one of his own comic songs as an encore, which brought down the house, much to the young man's delight. With his own Royal Standard Opera Company he made several tours through Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand, superintending the musical rehearsals and playing leading comedy parts in a repertoire of comic operas. With the Roling-Brough and Dion Boucicault Comedy Company, so famous in Australia, he appeared in several farcical comedies. Later on he toured throughout the whole of the Australian country with his humorous and musical recitals. In Sydney he organised and conducted the Sydney Opera Society producing "Mariana," "Faust," "The Grand Duchess" and other operas in conjunction with Mr. J. C. Williamson. Mr. Grossmith has travelled professionally nearly round the vast Australian continent. Twice round Tasmania and once round both islands of New Zealand. During his eastern tour he visited Straits Settlements, India (including the Afghanistan and Cashmere borders), Arabia, Egypt, Sicily, Malta, Morocco, Gibraltar, etc. In addition to visits in Scotland and Ireland, Mr. Grossmith has made several very successful appearances in vaudeville, notably at the London Tivoli and Oxford, and several of his stage compositions were presented at the London houses when Mr. Grossmith acted as Orchestral Conductor. On Wednesday, May 8th, at the College Hall, Mr. Grossmith commences at St. John's, a proposed tour throughout the whole of the American continent.

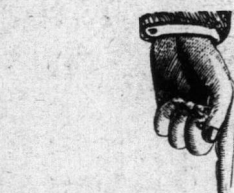
