Root Them Out.

The call for tenders for the purchase of the Government farm and the implements on it, marks the last stage in the wrecking by the Morris government of an attempt to place agriculture on a scientific and rational basis. That policy was instituted by Sir Robert Bond. The fact that he was the author of it seems to have been sufficient to make it a target for senseless attacks and for a system of wrecking by those who had the power to do so. That the policy has proved successful wherever tried apparently counts for nothing. The success of the Danish effort apparently matters not. The revolutionising of Danish farming by its means and the turning of Denmark from a bankrupt farming country into a land flowing with milk and honey is passed by as of no account. The success of the effort in Ireland is passed by. The lesson of Canada awaits not. Dr. Robertson is brought down here to inspect and advise. But his life-work is ignored. Sir Edward Morris speaks of Dr. Robertson as the Miracle Worker on Agriculture, but the means by which Dr. Robertson worked the miracles is slighted. And for what? For a policy of sops to heeblers and supporters. The policy instituted included the payment of large sums in the way of salaries and expenses to three members of the Morris Party in the House of Assembly, whose services would have been flouted in Canada, Ireland, Denmark or England as managers of an Agricultural policy; the payment of salaries to school teachers as secretaries of Agricultural Societies, and the squandering of money recklessly in the case of the Agricultural exhibition in St. John's. In short, the policy was a policy of giving-out. It has earned the derision of the electorate, and to-day is looked upon as one of the big failures of the Morris administration. It is an outward and visible sign of the delusion of the Morris administration that the electorate can be captured in the distribution of sops among a crowd of grabbers throughout the Colony. At the General Election the Morris Administration will have a rude awakening. Its members are past political regeneration. The only cure is to root them out and root-out they will be.

President Wants Panama Bill Reviewed.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
The Panama Canal Bill has been agreed to by a conference of senate and House and passed House by a viva voce vote. As passed, the bill which provides for the government and administration of Canal, contains provisions for the passage of American coastwise vessels through Canal free of tolls and the admission of ship-building material to canal zone free of duty. The bill already had passed the senate. It now goes to President for his signature. President Taft and his cabinet discussed the Panama Canal bill and the question of a possible presidential veto of the measure. No decision was reached. The President's inclination is to approve of bill, but he is anxious to have a provision made for a legal test of the matter of free tolls for American ships. The cabinet it is understood, agree with him that there is a basis for believing the bill with the free tolls clause in it is not in conformity with the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. When the conference over, the president was still of opinion, that the best way to test the bill's agreement with treaty was to have the States Supreme Court pass upon it.

Aitkin's Talk.

MONTREAL, To-day.
That the work being done in England by Borden has greatly changed the trend of public opinion in England toward Canada and that this will mean a great acceleration of capital to this country, was a statement made by Sir Max Aitkin, a member of the British Parliament, who is in Montreal. Sir Max paid a high tribute to Bonar Law. On the whole he was declared to be looked upon as the man most before the public eye in England at the present time. I think that it is only fair to say that no political leader has had a more devoted following or enjoyed the confidence of his fellow members to the same extent.

Notes From Bay-de-Verde

The trap fishery is over and nearly all the traps have been taken ashore. A few traps have done fairly well, but the majority have a poor voyage, and the total catch will be thousands of quintals behind that of last year.

At Baccalieu Tickle, the famous fishing ground, the fishery there to date is practically a failure, both with traps and hook and line. From Old Perlican we learn that the fishery has also been a failure, and the North Shore catch to date is the worst for years.

Squid bait is now procurable, but their advent has not improved fishery operations, and the outlook for a good fall's fishery is anything but bright. Unless an improvement soon takes place the hook and line fishery will be a failure, a fish is reported very scarce on the ground.

The weather has been very bad for curing fish and as a result there is very little yet ready to ship to market.

We wish to call the attention of the Government to the condition of the roads, which are in such a state that it is nearly impossible to drive over them. The road to Grate's Cove in particular is in a disgraceful condition, several of the bridges being broken, and large ruts which make driving, especially in the night, very dangerous. Clergymen travelling over this road at night do so at the risk of their lives, it being almost impossible for any kind of vehicles to pass over it. We would advise the Government to send Road Inspector Bonia around to see that the roads are made fairly passable.
