NEW YORK, August 12.
David C. Prevor, an air critic, of international reputation, fell early today from a window in the fifth floor of an apartment house, and was instantly killed.WASHINGTON, August 12.
The uprising led by Cipriano Castro in Venezuela is officially reported by the American Consul at Caracas as a failure. He confirms the report that General Torres and his officers, who headed the revolution in the Eastern part of the country, have all been captured.

VANCOUVER, August 12.

A vigorous protest against the use of the word Roman before Catholic, when referring to the Catholic Church, was entered by Archbishop Casey, in the course of a sermon preached in St. Patrick's Church here. The Archbishop said the official title of the Catholic Church is the Roman Catholic Church.

SOUTH SHIELDS, August 12.

The officers of the steamship Lucille, which has arrived here, deny the report that they saw the Titanic wreck apparently resting on a ledge of rocks. They saw during the voyage from Philadelphia wreckage consisting of a part of a mast and some gear probably attached to some submarine object, six miles to the southwest of the site of the Titanic wreck. They discredit the story that the Titanic rests on a submerged reef.

LONDON, August 12.

The Standard tells of a new development in the militant movement and says that emissaries of the militant suffragettes are inciting the dock laborers and others in the East End to start rioting, promising them in the event of their being sent to jail, that their families will be provided for out of a special fund on a more liberal scale than the men are able to do. This proposal is in accordance with a speech made by Sylvia Danks in the East End on July 21. The Women's Social Political Union denies any knowledge of the plan.

ALBANY, August 12.

The report of the Traveller Legislative Committee, charging Governor Butler with having diverted campaign contributions to his own private use, was adopted by the Legislature today, and a resolution to impeach him for "wilful and corrupt conduct in office and for high crimes" was offered in the Assembly by majority leader Levy. The adoption of the report carried with it a recommendation that Louis Sarecky and Frederick Cullen, who refused to answer certain questions asked by the Committee's counsel, be held in contempt of the Legislature and punished. Never before in the history of the State has her Chief Executive been impeached.

ADEN, Arabia, August 12.

A small remnant of a camel corps of British native troops, which had lost many officers and men killed and wounded in a battle in the British Somaliland Protectorate with followers of the Medjahid, the British Commissioner and Commandant, Chief Horse Bratt, upon hearing

reports, sent a flying column to the aid of the camel corps. The reinforcements found all that was left of the camel corps entrenched eight miles southeast of the town of Burmao. The camel men had been ambushed by 2,000 Dervishes who had killed one white British officer, wounded another, as well as killing and wounding fifty or sixty native troops. Heavy losses had been inflicted upon the Dervishes. The Commissioner has advised the Colonial office, London, that many thousands of tribesmen are on the war path and that the town of Burmao may likely be attacked.

LONDON, August 12.

Japan is afraid one of her most important naval secrets will fall into the hands of a rival power through the loss of a torpedo from the new battleship Kongo, on a trip recently of the Irish coast. The Japanese Government has offered a reward of £10,000 for the recovery of the torpedo. This is five times the amount usually offered by the British Government under similar circumstances. The explanation, according to the Daily Mail Gazette, is that the torpedoes of the Kongo are unique in construction, and that they embody unusual secrets of construction. They have a much longer range and are more deadly than the newest type of British torpedo, and are said to be propelled by engines worked by heated air, generated by a spiral, the composition of which is a discovery of Japanese scientists and unknown to the outside world. The Kongo is believed to be the only ship in the world carrying such a projectile. A big fishing fleet is searching Belfast Lough for the torpedo in the hope of earning the reward.

LONDON, August 12.

The Post finds a parallel between the situation which preceded the Spanish-American war and the present Mexican situation. It says it is President Wilson thinks with patience that good words and patience will solve the problem, he will drift into the storm he wishes to avoid. But that if he sees that nothing short of strong government in Mexico will make maintenance of peace possible he will decide either to befriended the party in Mexico that offers the best prospect of efficiency, or be ready to intervene with such promptitude and such force as may insure the result at which he aims. The Post adds it is to be hoped President Wilson is not an adherent of the doctrine of pacification. The Chronicle considers Wilson's demand that Huerta resign the Presidency of Mexico a curious experiment in foreign diplomacy, and one that is scarcely likely to be carried through easily. A proud race like the Mexicans, and a President with a fairly strong backing, the editorial says, are very unlikely to surrender, and we doubt if the States would care to face the stupendous task of reducing Mexico by force of arms. Wilson's demand for a general election almost borders on the ludicrous, because there is no such thing in Mexico as an election by ballot as the ballot is understood in great democratic countries.
