Landlords.

In response to an invitation issued by the Secretary of the Board of Trade, some forty or more tenants of absentee landlords met the Committee of the Board, which has been investigating the tenants' grievances. It soon developed that the main grievance had little to do with the question whether a landlord was an absentee or a resident. The circular of invitation showed that there had been a lack of clear thinking, for it spoke of the desirability of every person having an option to own his residence and place of business. Obviously the desideratum is the same whether the landlord is resident or non-resident. Again, it is given as a hardship that 1,200 tenants are paying a hundred thousand dollars a year to absentee landlords. Mr. Morine expressed his regret that this aspect of the matter had been dwelt. He pointed out that if the absentee landlords were bought out, say by the State, and tenants afforded means to become owners, the money would go out of the country as interest. The matter of affording means to lessees to purchase is a general proposition which affects all tenants, wherever their landlords may reside. The matter of renewals of leases on equitable terms is also one of general import, and these were the matters which were mostly dwelt upon. The general feeling of the meeting was that the business was of such importance that the work should be continued and citizens generally should be interested. There were many strong expressions against unreasonable, inequitable and unfair burdens which were cast by landlords on tenants, such as forcing tenants to pay all taxes and to keep insured building raised by tenants, and the extortions made when tenants ask for renewals. As one speaker expressed it, all the bad landlords are not absentees, nor do all the good landlords reside in the city. There are good absentee landlords and good resident landlords, bad absentee landlords and bad resident ones.

Asquith War Secretary.

WILL HE SEND FOR KITCHENER? One must admire the strength and resolution of Premier Asquith in taking up the onerous duties of the War Secretary in addition to a general supervision of the Government, and the leading of the House of Commons. In addition to holding the office of Prime Minister, Mr. Asquith is the First Lord of the Treasury and as such draws a salary of £5,000. It is customary for the First Lord, if a Con-

moner, to be ex-officio, Leader of the House of Commons, and his duties are mainly political. In reality, this is a means of providing a salary for the leader of the House, untrammelled by the usual duties of head of a department. The real financial head of the Treasury is the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the First Lord is a nominal political head. Of old, the Lord High Treasurer was the head of the Department. For the past three hundred years the office has been in commission. The First Lord is the leading Commissioner and as such he is not considered as holding such an office of profit under the Crown, as enables the holder to be transferred to an office of profit without vacating his seat in the House of Commons. Mr. Asquith has to seek re-election. He has represented East Fife, since 1885.

His twenty-eight years holding of the seat, together with his big majority in 1910, makes his seat absolutely safe. Col. Seeley made reference to the likelihood of a re-organization of the Army. If Mr. Asquith could prevail upon Lord Kitchener to become the First Military member of the Army Council, the pair, Asquith and Kitchener, would not be long in putting the Army on a sound footing.

"Success" Reaches Port.

A HISTORIC AND EVENTFUL TRIP—VESSEL LEFT HERE FOR BAHIA BUT WAS STORM-TOSTED—HAD TO JETTISON CARGO AND PUT INTO BARBADOS IN A BADLY CRIPPLED STATE—FAILED TO REACH HER DESTINATION—CREW REFUSED TO CONTINUE THE VOYAGE TO THE BRAZILIAN PORT—VESSEL UNSEAWORTHY—ONE SEAMAN DESERTS—SUCCESS ORDERED HOME FROM BARBADOS AND BRINGS BACK PART OF FISH CARGO TO SHIPPERS IN GOOD CONDITION.

It is a unique occurrence to see a cargo of fish brought to St. John's from a West Indian or Brazilian port, but such was the case to-day when the three-masted schooner Success, Capt. Churchill, arrived and returned the greater portion of her cargo, the balance having had to be jettisoned. The vessel came from Barbados where she put in, after a tempestuous passage, having failed to reach Bahia, her destination. When approached by our reporter, Captain Churchill said "I have nothing new to report," although it was one of the most trying, eventful and worst experiences he ever had and has made history for the vessel.

The Success left here on January 14th last, with about four thousand drums of fish for Brazil shipped by Messrs. Goodridge & Sons. The first week or so at sea favorable weather was met. On February 1st, a strong northwest gale raged, accompanied by heavy seas. The vessel was "bowed to" but made very little headway. Her decks were continually swept by the huge waves and everything moveable carried away. There was no let up and gale succeeded gale to the anxiety of the crew. An occasional blizzard was encountered with an intensely cold temperature, that made conditions difficult and tedious for the crew to work. The following day, February 2nd, the wind alternated to the N.N.E. and blew with greater velocity and later shifted to the N.E. A regular hurricane was then experienced and the vessel was knocked about badly. Sometimes the crew thought they would never see land again as the vessel was almost thrown on her beam ends. On February 3rd, the storm continued with all its blast and the Success lost all her headgear and was almost disabled.

But to make matters worse the "rudder trunk" became disordered and the vessel began to leak. It was an anxious time and all on board thought their doom was sealed. The hatches were taken off and 1,000 packages of fish jettisoned. This put the vessel on an even keel. Three members of the crew were kept working at the pumps, managing to keep the after hold free of water while the rest of the seamen confined their efforts to throwing over cargo. On February 4th the vessel was upright and the following day when Capt. Churchill, and crew were worn out from hardship and loss of sleep, the Success was crippled into Barbados, where the vessel underwent permanent repairs, but the crew refused to continue the voyage to Bahia. One seaman deserted and a negro was signed on in his place. However, the shippers of the cargo at this end decided that the fact of a portion of the cargo having to be jettisoned would be prejudicial to the sale of the fish in Bahia, and accordingly ordered the vessel to return with her cargo which is equivalent to about 3,000 quintals.

The Success left Barbados on the 6th March and made an excellent run until reaching the Grand Banks when adverse winds were met. On Sunday the vessel got down off Trepassy Bay and "lay to" that night. Yesterday morning she made good progress, and was off Ferryland when taken in tow by the tug D. P. Ingraham and brought to port at 11 a.m. to-day. The returned cargo, we are informed by Mr. Goodridge, will be reshipped to Brazil. The crew of the Success are well after their trying time.

Sunday's outgoing express reached Port aux Basques at 1.40 a.m. to-day. Yesterday's outgoing express left Notre Dame Junction at 8.40 a.m. to-day.

An express will leave Port aux Basques after the arrival of the Lintrose. The local train from Carbonear via Broad Cove, arrived in the city at 12.45 p.m. to-day.

Billiards.

Billiards is a game the origin of which no one can with certainty tell. Like bowling, it is thought by many to have been derived from the ancient British game of bowls. When bowls could not be played out of doors because of the weather, a bowling green was set up indoors, and as there was no fun in hurling the balls in such close quarters, they were struck with a mace, and later with a cue. Many men believe that billiards was not an invention, but a growth, while others maintain, most likely because of the name, that it was a French invention, and they contend that it was played by the Germans, Dutch, Italians and French long before it appeared in England. But on this matter there is room for doubt. A number of literary references to the game may be found in Elizabethan days.

Mary Queen of Scots was an enthusiastic billiard player and Shakespeare seems to make some covert references to this fact when in his "Antony and Cleopatra" he makes Cleopatra play at billiards. Ben Jonson uses the phrase "smooth as a billiard ball." Long after these men wrote, Byron makes the "harmless game of billiards" rhyme with "milliards."

Tango Thieves Active.

Paris, March 19.—A new type of petty criminal has recently been classified by the police. They give him the name of "tango pickpocket."

The present vogue of complicated dances, such as the tango, furlana and maxixe has given the entree to Paris ballrooms to many persons of unknown antecedents whose sole recommendations is that they are exceptionally good dancers. Thus an attractive young woman, who for some weeks frequented the exclusive society of a dancing club where she was believed to be a Russian Princess turned out to be a lady's maid, while a number of ex-waiters, ballet dancers and circus performers playing the roles of Argentine millionaires, have enjoyed unlimited hospitality in some of the best social circles on the strength of their skill in the tango.

The police have now discovered that many of these pseudo aristocrats have been taking full advantage of the complicated attitudes which the tango and its kindred dances involve to pick pockets and purloin jewelry. The number of reports which have reached the police of pearls which have been lost at dances this year is above the average. The authorities believe that the reason is that, while the fair dancer's attention was concentrated upon the proper placing of her feet in the intricate poses, her partner was busy removing valuables and trinkets from her person.

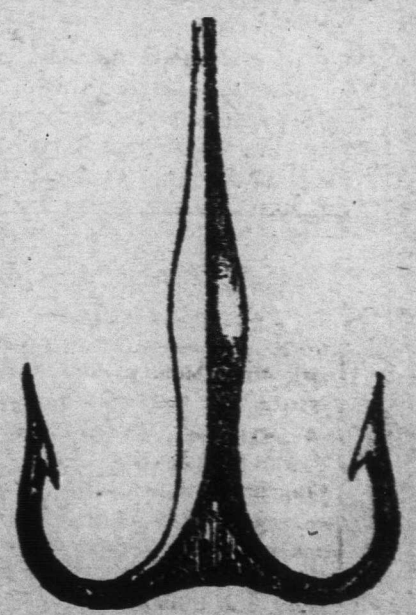
