Germans Call Kaiser

ONE OF MANKIND'S FOES.—SAYS KAISER HAS COVERED THE NATION WITH IMPERISHABLE INFAMY.

London, Dec. 29.—The Morning Post has received from Herr Karl Bernstein, who writes from Rotterdam, the following translation of a New Year's appeal to be issued to the Socialists in Europe and America by the committee of the German Humanity League:

"Dear Comrades—On the eve of a New Year, which opens up on scenes of fear and ruthless crime unparalleled even in the massacre rolls of our nation's infamous accomplices at Constantinople, we appeal to our brethren on the continent of Europe and in the United States of America not to hide themselves behind the screen of neutrality.

"We are face to face with the enemies of mankind. The German nation, driven into this wicked war by the Kaiser and his military entourage,ajoiled by the perfured States in the Reichstag and by the false records circulated in every State in order to deceive our compatriots, has recklessly hurled itself blindfolded against forces, which, sustained by indisputable moral considerations show no signs of weakening in their determination to expel from Belgium the troops which have covered her habitations with blood and irreparably injured an innocent nation our rulers had sworn to protect.

"We ask you to remember that the territory of no German State has been menaced by the Allies, who are lawfully and honorably defending the plain rights of the cruelly outraged Belgians.

"Fellow-workers, can you longer remain idle and silent spectators of these stupendous crimes?

"Are you forever to be dumb in view of the awful scenes of carnage in Flanders, in Brabant, in Alsace and in Lorraine?

"Do you not see amid the maiming and slaughter of innocent, unnamed old men, women, children and infants at the breast that the Kaiser has covered our nation with imperishable infamy, and that the toll of war means the sacrifice of the precious lives of toilers and wage earners in a devilish campaign, barbarous in its methods upon sea as upon land?

"We know from authentic intelligence which reaches us, that the restless, indignant and deceived democracy, now undergoing privations and nursing its grief, cannot be restrained by force from making an active protest, and we most earnestly appeal to every comrade who cares for maintenance of international obligations, to strive his utmost to crush and sweep away forever the domination of Prussian militarism within Germany, which by its conspiracy against humanity has disgraced and humiliated our nation in the eyes of the civilized world."

British Labor Made Krupps.

"There died in Reading recently a man who some years ago occupied the position of managing engineer at Krupp's works at Essen. This was Mr. Robert Hall, who had attained the age of 82," says the Star.

"In the course of a conversation which Mr. Hall had with me a few days ago, he said that the building up of Krupp's firm, to the magnitude which it had attained, was largely due to British labor, and in a measure to the parsimony of the master engineers of this country nearly 50 years ago.

"In explaining this, Mr. Hall said there was about that period an agitation for more wages on the part of engineers in England, and the fact that employers of labor here refused to make a concession must by some means have become known to the founder of Krupps, as just about that time tempting advertisements were inserted in English newspapers representing that Krupps needed the finest skilled workmen in the different branches of their business, 'Englishmen preferred.'

"I went as one," said Mr. Hall, "and many others from different parts of this country I found there on my arrival, whilst others followed me. We were as well paid as our work merited.

"The works grew by leaps and bounds, and came to be known as the finest establishment of its kind in the world, but it was largely, very largely," added Mr. Hall, "British labor that did it."
