Germany's Honour.

No person with good human blood running through his veins, can refrain from just and righteous indignation over the outrages committed by the German barbarians prior to their forced retreat from Lille.

The bare reading of the scathing description of their atrocities in the cabled despatches marks them in the eyes of the world as the victims of unbridled and unbridled lust and devilry.

And the Allies are being asked to consider an offer of peace from these savages whose crimes have broken the decalogue into microscopic atoms and whose deeds have run through the whole gamut of lasciviousness and carnality.

Who can scan the news of yesterday, wherein the story of the unspeakable and unprintable perpetrations of the Kaiser's swine are told, without feeling that it is the duty of civilization to exterminate the unnatural breed inhabiting Germany, and raze their cities to the ground.

Not content with their diabolical acts in the beginning of the war, amongst which may be mentioned the rape of Belgium: the destruction of the beautiful cities of France; the bombardments of churches on the day of Corpus Christi; the sinking of the Lusitania; the torpedoing of hospital ships; the bombardment of Red Cross hospitals; the murder of Edith Cavell and Captain Fryatt; the slaughter of innocent non-combatants; the butchering of women and children; the outrage and defilement of the good sisters and their convents; the wanton destruction of churches, together with hundreds of other acts of cruelty and bestiality, they continue and delight in their diabolical work.

What a frightful thought it is that the war may be fought in our own country! This is the weapon to beat Germany to her knees—the carrying of the war into her own territory, and the infliction of reprisals for the wanton damage done in France and Belgium.

O-DAY'S MESSAGES. NOON.

THE KING'S SPEECH. LONDON, Oct. 21. Via Reuter's Agency.—Received at 12.15 p.m. King George, a large deputation of inter-parliamentary delegates, including the British, French, Italian, Belgium and Spanish representatives. His Majesty, speaking in French, recalled the visit of the French Chamber of Deputies to the French Chamber of Deputies at the time when the French were sustaining with inconquerable valor the shock of enormous forces at Verdun.

Addressing the Belgian representatives, the King referred to the various parliaments responsible for the conduct of the war. He particularly commended the assurance that Marshal Foch enjoys the admiration and admiration of the soldiers of all the armies. His Majesty paid a tribute to the sustained spirit of France and cheerful, buoyant spirit of France and Italian warriors, and congratulated the French on the approaching restoration of the provinces, which after 47 years ago.
