"The Civil Service Carnival."

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—There is one point raised at yesterday's meeting of the Board of Trade which being the "crux" of the whole awful mess that the country is in to-day, must receive a thought from all discerning men who have the better affairs of their Island Home at heart; and that is the item which refers to the unnecessary expense of Government. Those most unnecessary expenses are many, too many, and too glaring in their extravagant progress, and why it is that a determined and honest effort (if there is such a thing as "honest effort") in the affairs of the Government has not been made long ago to have such money-absorbing hobbies cut out, is to say the least of it, very, very strange. Why, sir, a most casual enquiry will convince one and all of us, that there are most unnecessary additional expenses brought into being the last couple of years. We have been saddled with luxurious items in Government circles, and meaning to the Colony thousands of dollars that the over-taxed people have to pay for. Every branch in the Civil Service has had its "panacea"; every department is glutted with expensive surfeit in the way of ridiculous engines of work. It seems to have been a premeditated plan of the present Administration to, with wanton waste and utter disregard, and flagrant contempt of the people's "modus operandi" throw away the country's best wealth on expensive hobbies. Take for example the General Post Office. A most unnecessary item (at least just now) is the partly erected new wing. This could have been done without. The postal department does not, or will not handle enough of business for some time to come, to justify the building of this one hundred and fifty to one hundred and eighty thousand dollar mausoleum. The business of the Postal Telegraphs does not call for it. What a reckless involving is seen here, when finance should have been hoarded 'till a better day permits the adding of high class hobbies to the scene of the general carnival with us under Government control. Again there is that joke—the Post Office vs. Family motor car, that sop to the Official Cerberus. For the last forty years the mails have been attended to, and attended to very properly by the old and reliable Coughlans van, and I cannot see the necessity of having introduced this new and expensive toy, called H.M. Mail car. The expenses of running that car—when it is doing Government service—comes "something" like \$2,000.00 a year, and the thing does not earn (even if it is justifiable at all) quarter that sum. The Coughlans have to still the old reliable "mag," and to the one receptacle of mail that the motor-car will take, the Coughlan express will take ten. True, the car does good work in the joy-riding line, and it has been placed on the records that its speed has registered as much as five miles and hour. Well, the Government pays, or rather the people pay, so what's the odds? Again I have been informed that two or three of the officials up at the post office have had telephones placed in their homes, a little gift of the Government. Now, Sir, strange to tell, those very officials are the ones whose duties least require the installation of those "phones" in their houses, and on the face of it it is a decided show of Government favor, or personal party favor, or if you like it better, political discrimination, to have allowed this thing to be done. Where is this going to stop? It would seem to me that some of those additional expenses could have been got without. In my next letter, with your kindly permission to the use of your columns, I shall show up some extravagances in connection with the Customs department.
