

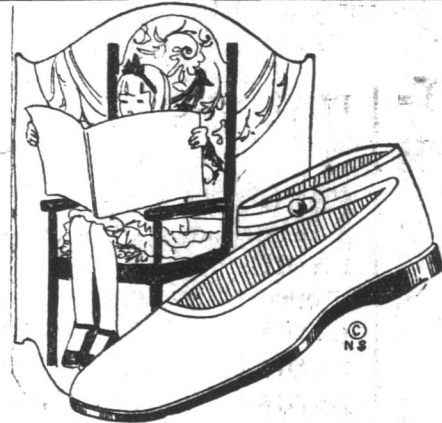

Codfish Reported Plentiful on West Coast

THE EXODUS STILL CONTINUES.
Mr. James McDonald, who returned
from the West Coast a few days ago
reports that a splendid sign of cod-
fish has made an appearance from
St. George's down the coast, and the
outlook for a good codfishery in
these waters promises to better that
of the past twenty years. With a
plentiful sign of fish in sight, it is
apparent that the fishery along the
West Coast offers no inducement for
the fishermen. During the last four
sailings of the Glencoe west to Port
aux Basques large numbers of men
whose main avocation was the fish-
ery have given up the country's great-
est enterprise with disgust, and made
connections at Port aux Basques
across the Gulf to seek a livelihood
elsewhere.

OPPOSED TO THE BUDGET.

OTTAWA, May 9.
W. D. Euler, Liberal, North Water-
loo, announced in the House of Com-
mons to-day, that he will vote
against the Budget. "I would say I
cannot approve of the more or less
haphazard changes which have been
made in the tariff," he said, in sum-
ming up his reasons for his decision.
"Changes are being made without
accurate knowledge of what they may
involve," he said. Hon. H. H. Stev-
ens, Conservative, Vancouver Centre,
advocated adequate protection for
Canadian industry. Adjournment of
the debate was moved by Hon. A. B.
Copp, the Secretary of State.

"In a plebiscite conducted by Mes-
srs. Fry of Bristol, 628,000 persons
voted on the subject of the best names
for girls. And, strange to say, the
Dorises and Imenes and Gladyses are
right out of the picture," says the
Star.
"At the head of the list stands the
beautiful old English name of
Phyllis, and next to it come Grace
and Elsie, but after these the pre-
ponderance of votes goes to simple
old-fashioned names like Barbara,
Patience and Prudence, Jane and Sus-
an, with Priscilla and Matilda also
near. Royal names are conspicu-
ously absent. The popularity of the
Princesses does not produce any ma-
jority for Mary, nor is the Duchess of
York's Elizabeth represented in the

which we should have put at the head
of the list, and we rejoice over Jane,
Philip Jane, which was for years
overshadowed by the more preten-
sious names of the Gwendolens type.
On the whole, this reaction to a choice
of simpler names for girls strikes us
as healthy. There is many a girl who
answers gracefully enough to Emrys-
tress at the age of ten, who finds it
rather a handicap at thirty."
