
Following the enquiry of the Council as regards the increase in the number of Scarlet Fever cases, the Health Officer reported that during the months of August, September and October the total number amounted to 50, one-third of which occurred in. the one institution, the other being irregularly distributed over the city; that he did not think there was any reason to anticipate an epidemic such as occurred last year. The type of cases had been mild, and recently were on the decrease, two cases only having been reported within the past week. The numer of cases of infectious disease in the City at present is as follows :- Scarlet Fever, 21; Diphtheria, 1: Typhoid, 32. The City Engineer reported that arrangements had been completed for" the dumping of material for filling in purposes at Quidi Vidi Lakeside.
