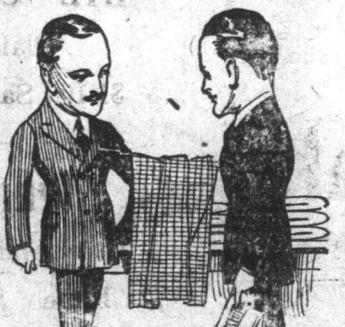

INTER CLUB BILLIARDS.

B. I. S. Leading By 180 Points.

There was a large attendance
of billiard enthusiasts present at the
Masonic rooms last night to witness
the continuation of the billiard tour-
nament between the B.I.S. and Mas-
onic players. In the two games play-
ed last night victory went to the
Masonic, and as a result they reduced
the B. I. S. lead by 60 points.

The first game, N. Snow (Masonic)
vs. A. Moakier (B.I.S.) was one of the
best for the series, and the many spec-
tators present were kept keenly in-
terested right through. Both players
were in good form and played good
billiards. Several times Snow got a
good lead, but Moakier always pulled
up again, and the final result was
never certain. The game ended, Snow
350; Moakier 345. The breaks were:
Snow (Masonic)—350—15, 13, 10,
25, 10, 25, 18, 20, 11, 11—168.
Moakier (B.I.S.)—345—10, 19, 12,
19, 17, 13, 28, 13, 12, 13, 11, 21, 13, 12,
11, 18—241.

The second game, D. P. Duff (Mas-
sonic) vs. J. Hickey (B.I.S.) was a
repetition of the first, and these play-
ers put up an excellent exhibition.
For practically the whole game the
players kept together with Duff lead-
ing and when he was 292 Hickey was
281. At this point, however, Duff for-
gave ahead, and making two or three
nice breaks, finished the game, while
his opponent added only four points to
his score. The result was, Duff 350;

MAK TRUCKS, INC.

Present Indications are that Current

Three Months Will Be Best Fourth

Quarter In Company's History.

Boston—On the basis of the present
outlook net earnings of Mack Trucks,
Inc., for the current three months
will exceed those of any previous
fourth quarter in history of the com-
pany. While the fourth quarter usu-
ally runs behind the third, it is ex-
pected that net this year will at
least equal the showing made in
preceding three months. This would
indicate a balance of from \$1,350,000
to \$1,500,000 or \$3.75 to \$4 a share on
the common, and bring net for the
full year close to \$15, or three times
the current \$5 dividend.

Ability of the corporation to earn
its full year's dividend in six months
even at the poorest time of the year
and under such abnormal business
conditions as have prevailed recently

CHARLIE WEINERT OUTPOINTS FIRPO.

NEWARK, Nov. 12. — Charles
Weinert, Newark heavyweight out-
pointed Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine
heavyweight in a twelve round no-
decision bout tonight in the opinion
of newspapermen at the ringside.

The Newarcker cleverly evading
Firpo's terrific right, outboxed his
South American opponent in every
skirmish, feinting him consistently
with his left and crossing with his
right, which put the Argentine in the
defensive during the most of the fight.
Firpo attempted to box with Weinert,
but his awkwardness was no match
for Weinert's skill, and although the
Newarcker was fast tiring toward the
close of the match, there was no ques-
tion among the ringside experts but
that his shade was decisive. There
were no knock-downs.

Firpo Took Hard.

Frankly Firpo endeavored to
counter with the terrific right which
once beat Weinert in two rounds in
Philadelphia before Firpo's fight with
Dempsy, but Weinert evaded any is-
sue with that right and tied up the
Argentine at every lead in which that
blow was involved.

Weinert gained confidence as the
fight progressed when he saw how
his style confused Firpo.
Although Weinert's margin was
wide, he absorbed considerable pun-
ishment himself, both fighters bleed-
ing profusely when the final gong
sounded. Firpo's face was badly cut,
both eyes being cut while blood
streamed from his nose and mouth.
Firpo weighed 222 and Weinert scaled
184.

Fast Preliminaries.

In a thrilling semi-final match,
Miguel Ferrera of Argentina, Firpo's
heavyweight sparring partner, knock-
ed out Jack Showers, Elizabeth N.J.,
negro, in the first round of a program-
med ten round affair. The end came
after two minutes and 14 seconds of
fighting.

The preliminaries, with a lone ex-
ception, proved to be a series of
knockout exhibitions. In the semi-
final Joe Lewis of New York outpointed
Harold Mayo of Bayonne, N.J., in
a ten round no decision affair in the
opinion of newspaper critics at the
ringside. The men are light heavy-
weights.

Billy Prestage, of England, knock-
ed out Jack Townsend, of Pittsburg,
in the second round of a six round
match.

In the opener Frankie Bates, of
Newark, knocked out Johnny Fields,
also of Newark, in the first round. A
crowd estimated at 8,000 attended the
exhibition.
