Nothing happened in the scoring line until ten minutes of play, when the Felidians scored the first goal of the season, from a corner kick. The ball was placed by Ellsworth, and glided off one of the M.C. backs into the goal. The Collegians, quite undisturbed, worked the ball against the wind and saw two good attempts made to score. Puddister kicked the ball just over the crossbar, while Johnson came back and grazed the upright. The Felidians cleared the ball from danger and made another determined attack. This time they were again successful when Tucker beat Drover for No. 2. During the balance of the half the Collegians held their opponents in check, having played a fine defence game. The half ended with the Felidians leading by 2 goals to nil.

Resignation of Bishop Accepted

RIGHT REV. E. J. BIDWELL, OF ANGLICAN CHURCH, RETIRES.

KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 6.—Meeting here to-day the executive committee of the Synod of the Anglican Diocese of Ontario decided to accept the resignation of Right Rev. E. J. Bidwell, Bishop of the Diocese, when His Lordship again insisted that his decision was final. The executive voted the Bishop an honorarium equivalent to six months stipend.

Bishop Bidwell, who has been the Church of England head in the diocese, which comprises a large district in Eastern Ontario, for twelve years, offered his resignation following the announcement that his wife had been converted to the Roman Catholic faith.

When the meeting opened to-day the Bishop handed a statement to the members in which he again insisted that his resignation be accepted.
