The prisoner Whelan was brought before the Court of Error and Appeal on Monday, when the Court deliver-

on Monday, when the Court delivered judgment on the question raised before it on Thursday last, whether the case should come before the court upon a writ of error or writ of appeal. The judgment upheld the Writ of Error by which it was unanimously held that the prisoner was properly before the Court. Mr J. H. Cameron then assigned the Errors which he claimed appeared in the records, which were those argued before the Queen's Beach as to the challenge of Sparks and the challenge of Hodgins: The other objections as to the jurisdiction of the Court, &c., were abandoned. The case was then argued by Mr. Cameron, Mr. Robinson and Mr. Anderson, after which the President said that with a view of hearing all the cases in the Court of Appeal, and to give themselves tull opportunity of doing justice to this case, they, had come to the conclusion of remanding the prisoner till the 22nd inst.

SPAIN.-It is bad for Spain that the people having driven out their common oppressor cannot come to an understanding among themselves. It was fondly hoped that when the first party of rebels to the present provisional government were defeated a short time ago, that bloodshed was at an end, and that harmony would be the characteristic of the establishment of a permanent form of government of some kind. This, however, was not to be. Disturbances have taken place at Malaga, and have resulted in fighting and the defeat of the insurgents. The rulers seem to be ex ercising more than usual moderation. and none of them (which is somewhat unique in the history of revolutions) has yet attempted to make himself an autocrat. Lewill be well, however, if circumstances and the commotions of the country do not call forth such a character, and furnish for his conduct the plausible excuse that any form of settled rule by any ruler is preferable

SOUTH HURON ELECTION .- A suit has been instituted against Mr. Isaac Carling, who was lately scated for South Huron, to recover for him the South Huron, to recover for him the penalty imposed by law on persons who sit in Parliament while holding contracts from the Crown. The suit is brought in the Court of Queen's Bench, and will turn upon the question whether Mr. Carling is, as eminent lawyers hold, a contractor with the Crown by virtue of the bonds which he gave as surety for two public officials. Mr. Sinclair has served him with a writ for the recovery of \$12,000, for having sat six days in the Assembly contrary to the Statute "in such case made and provided."

NORTHUMBERLAND ELECTION .-The declaration day for Northumberland was Tuesday, when the numbers were announced to be: Hutchinson were announced to be: Hutchinson, 1,133; Gough, 894; majority L. Hutchinson, 239. Mr. Hutchinson made a speech expressing his wish to bury the past, and declared his readiness to work with Mr. Mitchell for the good of the Province. Mr. Mitchell also spoke accepting Mr. Hutchinson's challenge to work with him. After this, a strong personal altercation took place, ending in something very like a disturbance, amidst which a protest against Mr. Hutchinson's election, on the ground of bribery and corruption, was handed to the Sheriff.
