The Riet Case.

The examination of Attorney. Mr. Bowell then gave notice that he would on Monday move for the ex-pulsion of Riel from the House.

They will be exempt from active duty in case of war; will be allowed to make simple affirmation in courts of law instead of taking the usual oath ; will have religious schools of their own : and besides the free grant of land, they will be offered most favourable terms of sea passage, an arrangement having been made with the Allan, Dominion, and Temperley lines of steamers reviving the system of passenger warrants. The number of immigrants from Europe during the period included in the report was 99,109, against 89,186 for the same time in 1872 showing an increase of 9,923. Those who have announced their intention who have announced their intention to settle in Canada now number 50,-630, an increase of 36.83 per cent. over the previous year. The amounts voted by the Govern-ment in aid of immigration was dis-tributed as follows:--Ontario, \$25,-000; Quebec, \$20,000; New Bruns-wick, \$10,000; Nova Scotia, \$10,000; British Columbia, \$5,000; making a total of \$70,000. During 1873 there were 3,184 pa-tents, copyrights, and trade-marks issued, against 2,215 the previous year.

The interest on the pub-lic debt has, of course, increased as the debt itself has gone on accumulating year by year. The joutlay on public works chargeable to revenue, and the cost of maintaining those works, including Government railways worked at a loss, has also increased, as they have parsed out of the stage of construction, chargeable to capital, into that of working, oharge-able to the Consolidated Fund. The additional subsidies to the several Provinces caused by the re-adjust-ment of the public debt adds another large item; the subsidies to Pro-vinces-which include, of course, the \$160,000 a year to New Brunswick, ostensibly as compensation for the abolition of her timber dues, but freally as 'better terms'-being in-creased by no less than \$350,000. Such is the legacy of obligations the Macdonald Ministry have left behind them."

Even the Montreal Star, an Opposition journal, 1s disgusted at the conduct of the Mail, which it says "bids fair to bear off the palm as the most disreputable paper in Canada." The Star calls on the press to cry down " this journalistic black-guardism."




