GEORGE V. WELL GUARDED London, April 20.—Though the days have gone by when the monarch was pro-tected during the hours of slummer by an attendant sieeping in a bed drawn across the door of his chamber. King George is by no means left unprotected during the night. Nnot only is the outside of the palace guarded by soldlers and detectives. but several night watchman have up and down the corridors through the hours of darkness. They are shed in thick felt sloppers so as not to wake the royal releoper, and one of them is always near the king's noom till hus majecty is called by his valet in the morning. Every door and window in the place is trequently scamined and is would be im-possible for any intruder to get in with-out his presence being discovered in a few minutes.
