

WEST ELGIN ELECTION.

One Hundred and Twenty-seven Charges
Against Agents and Respondent.

The Trial to Take Place on Wednesday
Next at St. Thomas.

The particulars in the petition against
the return of Mr. Finlay G. McDiarmid,
M.P.P. for West Elgin, were filed at
Osgoode Hall. There are 127 charges
covering the majority of offences enu-
merated under the election law. The
personal charges against Mr. Macdiar-
mid are that he bought drinks for the
electors of Aldborough prior to the elec-
tion and on election day, and also that he
furnished them with tickets upon which
they could obtain liquid refreshments.
It is also charged that bribery was com-
mitted by agents. Wm. Frick, jun., of
St. Thomas, is named as having laid
wagers on the result of the election, as
follows:—With Benjamin Stewart, \$15;
with H. Langham, \$10; with Thomas
Coleman, \$25; with James Coleman,
\$10; with Wm. McVey, \$10, and with
Albert Corley, \$1.50. In the above
bets it is charged that Frick, jun., acted
for his employer, Benjamin F. Honsinger.
He is also charged with having
taken \$5 from the same source with
which to bribe his father, Wm. Frick,
sen., and \$25 with which to purchase
votes among Honsinger's employees at
\$2 per vote. Mr. Honsinger, with Mr.
J. C. Ponsford, are also charged with
having paid the expenses from and to
Toronto of E. W. Honsinger, dentist.
Agents are also charged with treating
on polling day at the Grand Central
Hotel, Exchange Hotel and Hutchinson
House, St. Thomas, the bartender of
the Hutchinson House, being named
as an agent. Dr. H. McL. Patterson,
of Rodney, is charged with bribery with
drinks, and Thomas Donley and Arch.
Cameron are named as supplying drink-
ables in St. Thomas. It is charged that
at the instigation of the agents of the
respondent the following and many
other persons who had no right to do
so voted:—William Cole, Aldborough
Township; Joseph Thomas, residence
unknown; George Calvert, Detroit;
William Scott, London; William Clay,
Alvinston; John and Charles Lang,
Yarmouth; William Moody, Yarmouth;
Edgar Sanders, Toronto; William Cross,
Edward Trump, Charles F. Maxwell,
jun., Louis Jones, G. W. Smiley, John
Cattanach, W. F. Nichol, G. W. Nunn,
John Ponsford and William McNab,
St. Thomas.

Thomas S. Gilbert is alleged to have
personated Thomas Gilbert in No. 2 di-
vision, Dunwich, and an unknown man
is said to have voted for Hugh Scott in
No. 1, Aldborough. John C. Ponsford
and other agents are charged with hir-
ing cabs and conveyances on election
day.

It is charged that there was a fund
provided which was used for corrupt
purposes, and that the following were
contributors to it:—A. W. Wright, To-
ronto, Conservative organizer; T. W.
Crothers, M. A. Gilbert, James H. Still,
Wm. Robert, sen., Richard A. Heard,
B. F. Hensinger, Benj. Luton, Dugald
McCull, Sperrin Chant, A. M. McIntyre,
A. B. Ingram, W. H. Ingram, F. M.
Griffin, Joseph Griffin, Timothy Cough-
lin and John A. McKillop.

Among others who are named as
agents of the respondent responsible
for wrongdoing are A. P. Campbell,
Thomas Oliver, Robert Meek, John
Ponsford, A. B. Ingram, Henry Elliott,
John Merry, John Cattanach, Patrick
Meehan, Isaac Gilbert, George Ponsford,
Anson Wallace, Dr. James Fulton, F. M.
Griffin and Joseph Griffin.

Intimidation is charged, of which the
victims were Alex. Marlatt and Oscar
Welter. Payment of money in St.
Thomas, ostensibly for services, but
in reality for votes, is alleged.

A Dastardly Act.

A deplorable affair occurred at St.
Thomas on Saturday evening. It ap-
pears that Glen Tyler, driver of Butler
Bros.' delivery wagon, entered an out-
house in the rear of Centre street
terrace, at the Ross street crossing,
which is the premises of a family named
Hulbert. The mistress of the place,
probably annoyed by what seemed to
her a case of trespass, picked up a pail
of boiling water, walked through the
yard, opened the door and emptied the
contents upon the unfortunate young
man. His agonizing cries brought the
neighbors to the scene, who did every-
thing to relieve the sufferer. He was
frantically burned around the abdomen
and down the legs, the flesh falling in
pieces from the body. After the doctors
had cut away his clothes, he was con-
veyed to his father's residence, where
he lies in a precarious condition. Mrs.
Hulbert was immediately arrested and
lodged in jail. On Monday she was re-
mandered until Friday, bail being refused.
She is 42 years of age, and has five
children and a husband. The latter is
a farm hand employed in Yarmouth.
Young Tyler is a son of Emery Tyler,
Michigan Central engineer.

THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Review of Past Two Years.—A Brilliant
Future.

The record of the Dutton High
School at the recent Departmental Ex-
aminations is one that excites
not only local but Provincial admiration.
That a high school, situated as it is in
a community with so narrow a
constituency and with a staff of only
three teachers, should not only equal
the other high schools and collegiate
institutes in the province but should
actually be found in the van of higher
education, speaks volumes of praise
both for the intellectual acumen of the
rising generation and the pedagogical
ability of the staff. Previous to the
past academic year no honor matricu-
lation or Fourth Form work had ever
been attempted by the school. The
staff, however, encouraged by the too
flattering result of last year and recog-
nizing in some of their students the
germs of future greatness, decided to
invite the High School Board to in-
crease the staff, to which suggestion the
Board generously responded by provid-
ing an additional teacher. That their
action was both judicious and timely is
amply proven both by the magnificent
results and the local and provincial ad-
vertisement which the school received
through the record of its students at
the university scholarship examinations.
To appreciate fully the honor that these
talented young scholarship students
have conferred on the school in general
and themselves in particular, one must
remember that the scholarship tests
are the hardest examinations in which
high schools and collegiate institutes
can compete. That our high school
should capture three scholarships, ag-
gregating \$460, is an eloquent commen-
tary on the efficiency of the staff and
the thoroughness of the work done in
our centre of learning. Here is the
record of the Fourth Form, which
speaks eloquently for itself:

W. Graham secured honors in zool-
ogy, botany, physics and chemistry and
heads the list in both zoology and
botany.

George Leitch secured honors in zool-
ogy, botany, physics and chemistry.

W. Pearce secured honors in zoology,
botany, chemistry, physics, algebra,
trigonometry and geometry.

F. McKerracher secured honors in
physics, algebra, trigonometry and
geometry.

Alda McKerracher secured honors in
physics, chemistry, algebra, trigonome-
try, Euclid, French, Latin, English
and history, and comes second in honor
chemistry and passed the senior matricu-
lation of both Toronto and Queen's
Universities.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

Geo. Leitch, \$160, in botany, zoology,
physics, chemistry.

W. Pearce, \$190, in trigonometry,
algebra and Euclid.

H. Hollingshead, \$110, in general
proficiency.

two years:

1899—Form I.—Recommended, 12;
passed 12, including 4 honors. Form II.
—Recommended, 24; passed 21. Form
III.—Recommended, 15; passed 12.

1900—Form II.—Recommended, 24;
passed 21. Form III.—Recommended,
10; passed 9. Senior Matriculation—
Recommended 5 and all passed with
honors, including three scholarships.

Junior Matriculation: Nina White, E.
Cusack, Alberta McColl, M. Dooley,
Ella James.

Application has been made to the
Department for senior leaving standing
for the Fourth Form candidates.

Deserving and diligent candidates
who have just passed the entrance will
be prepared for the Public School Leav-
ing in one year.

The principal of the school will be
glad to furnish information either orally
or by letter to candidates contemplating
a high school course.

Parents are earnestly requested to
have their children present at the
opening of the school, as there will be
no delay in the work.

Full provision is made for all examina-
tions of the Education Department
and for the pass and honor examina-
tions of the universities in all depart-
ments.
