The first liquor bill introduced in the

The first liquor bill introduced in the Michigan Legislature this year, by Mr. Leach, of Tuscola, makes it unwholesome for people who get drunk. It is not less than \$25 ner more than \$200 for the first oftense, or from six months to one year at lonia; for the second offense, within twelve mentis, a fine of from \$100 to \$300, and impresement not less than six months. months, a fine of from \$100 to \$300, and imprisonment not less than six months. Additional offenses are taxed \$300 to \$500, with from one to five years in the State prison. Any person shall be deemed drunk when he is so far under the influence of intoxicants that he is visibly excited or his judgment is impaired. Liquor dealers are made accessory to the drunkenness, and may be punished to the same extent as the drunkard.
