LONDON AND ENVIRONS.
—The main hall of the Tecumseh House
is being refitted.

—The Dragoon Club have issued invita-
tions to their closing ball on April 3.

—Mrs. Malcolm Coleleigh, formerly of
this city, is visiting Mrs. George Taylor, of
Talbot street.

—Dr. Ferguson's postponed lecture on
"Eyeght" will be given in Knox Church
this evening.

—Mr. Alex. Tait, of this city, has been
called to Mitchell, where his father lies
hopelessly ill.

—Rev. Principal Miller, of Huron col-
lege, preached in St. James' Church, South
London, Friday evening.

—The Bishop of Huron was announced
to preach at Theodore yesterday but his
illness prevented him.

—No. 3 G. T. R. express from the east,
due about 11:30 a.m. was detained three
hours owing to snow Saturday.

—Mr. Sam Griggs, of this city, has sub-
scribed generously to the new Salvation
Army barracks fund at Wingham.

—In March, 1890, the number of prison-
ers in the county jail was 53, while at present
only 10 are incarcerated there.

—A little daughter of Mr. Robert Lewis,
of Lovett street, died on Friday from
scarlet fever. The house has been placar-
ded.

—Rev. W. J. Clark, of the First Presby-
terian Church, will deliver a lecture in the
Union Presbyterian Church, Brucefield, on
March 19.

—Separate School Inspector Donovan is
in the city and will remain for a week.
This is his first visit since his appointment
to the Western district.

—Since the police have assumed control
of the shop and vehicle licensing they claim
to have collected \$40 more, for junk shops
than the city ever had before.

—The new brass sliding poles at the
Central Fire Station have proved a great
convenience and time-saver. Four seconds
will suffice to slide from the top story.

—By the recent action of the Police Com-
missioners Chief Williams will have to look
after about one-third of the licenses in the
city, including the livery, second-hand,
cab and dray licenses. Inspector Bell will
look after the remainder of the licenses.

—At a meeting of St. George's Society
held on Thursday evening, it was decided
to celebrate St. George's Day April 23, by a
banquet, and attend divine service the
preceding Sunday. A strong committee
was appointed to carry out the arrange-
ments.

—There was no business at the Police
Court Saturday.

—Residents of the northwestern portion
of the city complain that the snow plow
did not make a clearance of the sidewalks
until 9 o'clock Saturday morning.

—A few sparks from the chimney of a
Blackwell's house, 510 York street, caused a
slight blaze in the attic Saturday.

The fire brigade answered the alarm, but
had the trip for nothing.

—Miss L. Race, of London, Ont., who
for so many years kept the art store in the
Temple of Music, has returned to this city
and for the present is visiting Mr. and Mrs.
F. A. Wells.—(Pueblo, Col., Chiefman.)

—The special services held every night
last week in Wesley Hall will be continued
this week, and on Tuesday and Thursday
afternoons. Conductor Salter will be pre-
sent at some of the meetings, which have
hitherto borne good results.

—The heavy stock of Mr. John Fletcher
was auctioned off Friday and brought a
good price, the heaviest purchasers being
Messrs. Heston and Perkins, of this city.

Mr. Fletcher intends going exclusively into
the riding school business and will build a
stable opposite his old premises on Dundas
street.

—C. Irving, Canadian superintendent
for Bonnet's, has issued a neatly printed
record of business failures in Canada and
the States during 1890. The work goes to
show, among other things, the increased
risk of failure where business is begun with-
out sufficient capital.

—The MacLennan Edinburgh Concert
Company has been booked for a perform-
ance at this city on Monday, March 22.
The company has been in Toronto for three
nights, and was given splendid receptions
by the large audiences. Admirers of
Scottish musical selections should mark the
date.

—The Ridgeway Standard says: "We
regret to learn that Mr. C. Gamble, the
well known photographer, has decided to
move to London, and will leave Ridgeway
in a month. He is a popular, genial good
fellow and a first class artist, thoroughly
understanding every phase of his profes-
sion. He will be succeeded here by Mr.
Norton, of London."

—Mr. W. D. Taylor, of the R. S. Wil-
liams Piano Manufacturing Company, Lon-
don, Ont., is in this city on an extended
visit with Mr. F. A. Wells. Mr. Taylor
and Mr. Wells were boys together in the
factory about twenty years ago. Mr. Tay-
lor is a very much improved man with the
appearance of Pueblo, considering its age—
Pueblo, Colorado, Chiefman.

—The concert to be held in the Opera
House on Monday night should be well
patronized, as the talent secured for the
occasion and the attractive numbers on the
programme will form an evening's enjoy-
ment for very many persons.

—The Ottawa correspondent of a Tor-
onto paper telegraphs: "Dr. Roome, M.P.
for West Middlesex, is in the city, and it
is reported that he is to be given a Govern-
ment appointment in order to open a con-
stituency in which Mr. Carling, Minister of
Agriculture, may present himself.

—Dr. Roome is here, but the rest of the report
is unlikely, as should West Middlesex be re-
opened it would be dead certain to return
a Liberal."

—Inspector Bell complains that Chief
Williams misrepresented him in the Police
Court Friday morning. "It is not my
duty to serve summonses," said Mr. Bell,
"but if it was I would serve them without
grumbling. The Inspector cited was the
first occasion when the policeman failed to
find the man wanted. There were but five
summoned and some of them have already
paid up and proceeded against them were
withdrawn. It is the chief's duty to at-
tend to the summoning."

—Mr. C. J. Winlow, of the Free Press
staff, returned to the city Friday after
a few days absence in Orillia. A transfor-

ranks of the bachelors, having become mar-
ried on Wednesday to Katherine G. Ben-
son, eldest daughter of Mr. J. B. Ben-
son, of that place. A large circle of friends
and acquaintances in this city will join in
wishing the genial bride and her win-
some bridegroom happy wedded lives.

—On Thursday afternoon in St. Andrew's
Church Bible class-room, Mrs. (Rev.) J. A.
Murray, wife of the pastor, was the
recipient of an address from the W. F. E.
and aid societies, expressing thankfulness
for her restoration to health, and as an
evidence of the place she occupied in their
affections. The address was accompanied
by a beautiful basket of flowers. Rev. Mr.
Murray replied suitably on behalf of his
wife. An excellent supper was served, a
large number of the lady workers of the
congregation being present.

—Judge Davis began the work of re-
counting the votes of the North Middle-
sex election at noon Saturday. Candidate
Hutchins was attended by Mr. A. B. Ayles-
worth, Q.C., of Toronto, and E. A. Bayly,
Q.C., of this city. Mr. T. S. Purdon, Q.C.,
and Mr. W. McDermid, of Lucas,
looked after the interests of Candidate
Taylor. The work proceeded slowly, and
was not concluded at a late hour in the
afternoon. So after seven divisions were
counted, an adjournment was made until
to-day at noon. As far as counted Mr.
Hutchins loses one ballot originally
counted.

A High Appointment.
Mr. Lee Bapty, of England, brother of
Mr. Harry Bapty, of this city, and who
was manager of the grand Edinburgh Ex-
hibition received such universal commenda-
tion, has received a significant recognition
of his ability by being appointed to take
charge of the great Jamaica Exhibition.
The commercial press speaks highly of the
selection.

Mr. Kilgour's Side.
It was not the fact, as some seem to
suppose, that Mr. Kilgour was in the recent
Division Court case as a principal. He was
there merely as a witness and entitled to
protection. He still asserts that Mr.
Reesey did use the word "perjurer" in
reference to him. While he admits that
the courtroom was not the place for per-
sonal chastisement, he says his Scotch
blood could not brook the insult, and he
thinks any person of self-respect would
have resented it as warmly as he did.

Ontario Underwriters.
At Friday's session of the Under-
writers' Association in Toronto, President
John Beattie, of Ferris, in the chair, the
suggestion brought before the convention
on the first day as to the amendment of one
of the statutory conditions inserted in in-
surance policies was again brought before
the meeting. It was decided to have a
deputation wait upon the Attorney-General
and confer with him as to the advisability
of striking out the objectionable clause.
The deputation appointed waited upon the
Premier, Hon. Mr. Hardy and Hon. Mr.
Fraser. After having explained the object
of their visit, Mr. Mowat said that the
statutory conditions that they wished to be
amended had been established by the
judges, but he is in doubt that a deputation
set would relieve their wants and promised
to consider the matter and act accordingly.

London's School Population.
In the Minister of Education's annual
report the school population of London is
7,659, with a total number attending of
5,318—2,760 boys and 2,558 girls. The
average attendance was 3,191—4 per cent.
below the average of Provincial cities. In
the Forest City Union is 744 children and
1,889 in the London Art School. Out of 24
pupils for primary examination, and 20
proficiency certificates were granted in the
advance class. There were 22 applicants
for certificates and 20 were successful.

An extract is printed in the Minister's re-
port from the report of the late Inspector
Boyle on the London schools, which says
that the salaries paid the teachers here is
small even to the verge of injustice in most
cases, and attributes it to the plethora of
inspectors looking for positions.

W. G. T. U. Social.
