In the Minister of Education's annual report the school population of London is 7,559, with a total number attending of 5,316-2,760 boys and 2,556 girls. The average attendance was 3,191—4 per cent. below the average of Provincial cities. In the Forest City there are 744 children of Separate school supporters, 422 of whom attend school.
