

The acts relating to amendments of the statute law, that to arbitrations and references, the Insurance Act, the several acts relating to joint stock companies, and the Loan Corporations Act that providing for the better audit of muni-cipal accounts, that extending the provisions of the Interpretation Act, the Fisheries Act, the several acts relating to municipal law, and that respecting the administration of justice in unorganized territories, are all measures of much public interest, and will, I am satisfied, meet with general THE HOURS OF LABOR.
