—St. Thomas Journal: The electric street railway is so nearly completed that it is expected that the electricians will run the first car over the road this afternoon, and that it will be opened for public travel tomorrow or the day following. The work of building the road was commenced on March 24, Mr. Charles Macbeth, C.E., of London, being engineer in charge of construction. The engineer expects the road will be fully equipped by next Tuesday, after which Mr. Macbeth leaves for Buffalo to take charge of the construction of a public work. His work in this city shows him to be a capable engineer.

WATCHFULNESS REQUIRED.

The department is bound, if it is within their power, to prevent the spreading of the pest. Instructions have been sent out by the department to examine all fruit on which there is any sign of the scale. All fruit will be watched carefully, and when infected will be destroyed. Dealers will have to be vigilant.

TWENTY-FIVE EXTRA LIGHTS

Offered by the London Electric Company

For the Sum Paid Under Their Present Contract if Given a Five Year Extension—Some Contracts Let by No. 3 Committee—Ald. Stevely Chairman Pro Tem.

At the meeting of No. 3 committee last night Ald. Stevely was chosen to act as chairman, in the absence of Ald. Taylor, who is ill. An important offer was received from the London Electric Company through the manager, Mr. C. B. Hunt. It was proposed to supply the city with 314 arc lamps, 2,000 candle power, for street lighting, at 23 cents per night, thus giving 25 new arc lamps to the city practically free on the condition that the contract be extended five years. At present there are 289 lamps, and the price is 25 cents. It was not desired, the letter from the company stated, to stop inquiry as to the cost of street lighting. On the contrary, they were quite willing to give the fullest information possible. They were satisfied the cost of the electric light plant under municipal ownership would be greater than at present—26 cents a light at least. The company were enabled to make their offer so low because their labor was employed on other lighting as well.

The chairman Mr. Hunt said the offer would certainly hold good if the committee called for tenders. It was understood, of course, that no wild-cat schemes would be brought in.

Ald. Jolly moved that the offer be submitted to the council. Ald. Wilkey wanted it filed for reference.

Ald. Hunt said the citizens were demanding that information as to municipal ownership be obtained, and it would therefore be more satisfactory to call for tenders.

The offer and also the committee's resolution to call for tenders were sent to the council to call upon.

A committee's attention to a scheme for manufacturing gas from garbage was filed.

Ald. Jolly did not think the city should pay anything for a weigh scales clerk in the east end, but after a long argument with Ald. Wilkey, moved that the clerk be allowed the fee.

Ald. Hunt's motion referring the by-

law to the council for a second reading carried.

On motion of Ald. Hunt, the opinion of the city solicitor will be obtained as to the council's power to allot spaces on the market square; also the petitioners for fixed market spaces will be asked if they will agree to move toward the city hall.

When the tenders for coal were laid on the table Ald. Wilkey moved that no tenders be considered if not handed in at the proper time—5 p.m. Ald. Douglass was present, and explained that one tender had been left at the city hall, and that he had overlooked it. Ald. Jolly thought it pretty hard to apply the rule in this case, but held that there should be no deviation. The motion carried. Three tenders were opened, and that of Bow-lan & Co. was accepted, being the lowest. The prices were: Grate, \$4.65; egg, stove and nut, \$4.90; soft, \$3.60; Blossburg, \$4.50.

Two tenders for inclosing the market square to make it an egg and butter market were received. One was at \$4.75 and 26 cents a foot for sidewalks, and the other at \$6.65, including sidewalks. The engineer said the sidewalks, if laid under the city contract, would cost about \$75. On motion of Ald. Jolly the first tender for the work, exclusive of sidewalks, was accepted, the sidewalks to be laid under the city contract. The successful tenderer was Morris Inwood.

A tender for removing the verandas for \$15 was also received. Laid over.

A petition against the tearing down of the verandas was read, and it disclosed that one of the petitioners was the tenderer for the work of pulling the veranda down.

The members present were: Ald. Stevely (in the chair), Hunt, Gerry, Wilkey, Jolly, the mayor, Chief Roe, Engineer Graydon, Inspector Bell and Secretary Bell.

WAR IN CAMP

Would-Be-Somebodies Responsible for a Disgraceful Scene—Military Notes.

Camp Carling was visited last night by many hundreds of citizens, and the attendance was the largest of any day this year. Of course, there are always some among a large number of men who are most emphatically impressed with their own importance, and this was the case of a small war on the camp grounds last night. The trouble arose over the officiousness of a corporal, who imagined himself a regular Napoleon. The corporal took a private to task, and the private in turn jumped on his "superior" officer, and threw him heavily to the ground. Other officers interfered, and the crowd grew to a multitude. The private was taken in charge by the crowd, who kept the officers from injuring the fellow. Baseball bats, sticks and even bayonets and swords were brought into requisition in the melee, which was but short-lived, as the police appeared and terminated it very suddenly.

The inspection for comparative proficiency was conducted all day yesterday by Col. Maunsell, who spoke highly of the efficiency of the men, who during the last two or three days have picked up wonderfully, and all concerned feel gratified at the results of a few days' instruction.
